616 Books Sent Out

Six hundred sixteen books were shipped last week by J. K. Gill for the schools of Coos county. These books have been segregated by the county school superintendent's office for the 71 school districts.

The selections were made by each school in accordance with the Oregon Law. The latter provides that the county court levy for a library fund, a tax sufficient to amount to not less than ten cents per child on the school census.

Coos county levies the ten cent minimum and due to delinquent tax not nearly all of this is realized by the districts, hence the number of books is limited.

Pupils Earn Reading Certificates
Three hundred eighty-eight boys

and girls of Coos county have received book league reading certificates, according to reports received in the office of county superintendent. Of these one hundred eighteen were earned by pupils of the Washington school, Coquille; thirty-four from Millington; ten from Fairview; seventeen, McKinley; seven, Powers; five, Coos River; six, Floras Creek; six, Norway; eleven, Roy; two, Allegany; twelve, Gaylord; ten, Hauser; sixteen, Valley View; ninety-one Bandon; four, Four-Mile; fifteen, Sitkum; seventeen, Coaledo, and five, Pleasant Hill.

Fairview, McKinley, Floras Creek and Coaledo are the only schools receiving gold seal certificates. The individual certificates are signed by the state superintendent and teacher,

while the school room certificates are signed by the state superintendent, governor and state librarian.

Republicans to Greet National Chairman at Portland, Aug. 11

Harry A. Slack, county chairman, Mary Randleman, county secretary, and Marvin Skipworth, state committeeman, all precinct committeemen in Coos county and all others interested have been invited to Portland this coming Tuesday, Aug. 11, to meet John D. M. Hamilton, chairman of the National republican committee, at a republican rally at night at the public auditorium at which Hamilton will be the principal speaker.

Arthur W. Prialux, state chairman, who dispatched the invitation to local party workers, states in his letter that Hamilton will arrive in Portland at ten o'clock Tuesday morning and will spend the day in a series of conferences with workers from all parts of the state getting first hand information on this state and its problems.

The Hamilton party which will come to Portland from Seattle will include fourteen members of the national committee staff and in addition several correspondents of eastern and mid-west newspapers.

Bureaus that will be represented at the conference include the women's division, the Young Republicans' organization, the press relations bureau, the speakers' bureau and the research bureau.

The address of Chairman Hamilton at the night meeting will be broadcast over radio station KGW from 8:30 to 9:30 o'clock. United States Senators Charles L. McNary and Frederick Steiwer, Representatives William E. Ekwall and James D. Mott and Roy Ritner, republican nominee of the second congressional district, will be among the distinguished republicans who will be on the platform with Chairman Prialux.

The meeting at night will be open to all who care to attend with no seats reserved, according to the invitations.
