## Peril U. S. Herds

Disease Carrier to U. S. Livestock.

By FRANK KIDGEWAY Farmers in the United States are calous of the disease-free condi-tion of their herds and flocks and insist that stringent measures be maintained to prevent the reintroand other human and animal plagues through increasing impor tations of foreign animals

Livestock producers have become alarmed over persistent efforts being made in Washington to lower embargo bars that aid in keeping farmers and ranchmen oppose the proposal of high ranking New Dealers to change restrictions now Present regulations forbid the importation of meat products from and-mouth disease exist. Federal officials propose changes that would permit the re-zoning of the Argenzones declared free of these two maladies.

Farmers' representatives say that "the efforts to break down the present embargo are wholly based on economic grounds, and are pursued with a careless disregard of possible grave consequences. Lives of human beings, as well as cattle, hogs and sheep, are in-volved. Foreign meat is not needed; farmers in this country even find it difficult to sell, at a satisfactory profit, the meat ani-

mals they produce.
Officials of the American National Live Stock Association believe one can fairly claim that imports of meat products from any zone of Argentina under present conditions would not constitute a dangerous threat to our herds and flocks."

They point out that the disease-free condition of live stock in this country has been attained at great expense. "That condition," says the association, "should be maintained in the future at all costs. No diplo matic coup, no international intrigue, no pressure from foreigntrade enthusiasts or well-meaning but misdirected f. se-trade advocates should be allowed to under-

Farmers wonder why this nation should spend millions to clean up diseases and then have foreign trade policies that threaten to undo all the good work. The United States is the only nation that has ever successfully stamped out footand-mouth disease.

Western cattlemen cannot forget the big foot-and-mouth disease outbreak in California in 1924 when nearly 100,000 of their cattle, sheep, hogs and goats were destroyed to stop it.
