Kills Self With Rifle

John B. Mulvihill, of Coaledo, died by his own hand there last Monday. He killed himself with the rifle he carried when he accompanied his brother, Clay Mulvihill, of Coquille, and others to fight the fire back of the Coaledo school house.

Clay had been keeping watch of his brother for several days, knowing from his actions that his mind was unbalanced, but did not realize how serious his condition was. While at the fire the unfortunate man attempted to shoot himself, but was stopped by his brother. He then escaped into the woods where Clay could not locate him and a single shot shortly afterward told the sad ending.

He had had a similar aberration a couple of years ago.

Funeral services are being held at the Schroeder Bros. Mortuaries at 2:00 p. m. this afternoon, conducted by Rev. W. Raymond Wilder. Interment is to be in the Masonic cemetery.

The deceased was born in Galena, Kans., Nov. 28, 1903. The family came here from California many years ago. He was a logger and had worked in several camps in the country.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Sarah Mulvihill, with whom he made his home at Coaledo, and two sisters, Mrs. Lon Denio, of Lakeview, Ore., and Mrs. Fred Christian, of Sacramento, Calif., and his brother here.

Republican Speaker Scores Un-American Administration

Due to the threatening fire conditions last Saturday night, the circuit court room was not crowded, though well filled, with an audience of men and women, to hear Samuel Galon, of Chicago, make a strong address on matters political.

The speaker prefaced his remarks with praise for the greenery and beauty of Oregon. They do not have forests nor forest fires in his state of Illinois, and he was captivated with this Pacific coast.

Mr. Galon said he did not believe in calling names; that this is a campaign of education, not vilification. Nor is it the Jeffersonian democracy which is being fought politically this year nor even the 1932 democracy. It is the New Deal program of constitution overthrow that republicans, old-time democrats and lovers of the American form of liberty are seeking to eliminate on November 3.

Instead of carrying out the democratic platform the New Dealers enacted into law the first eleven planks of the socialist platform.

Returning prosperity? Thirteen other nations have made greater strides in emerging from the depression than has the United States under Roosevelt's brain-truster New Deal program.

In Chicago WPA workers and those on relief who did not register democratic and turn out and vote at the primaries found their names off the rolls the next day.

The democratic platform of 1932 proposed to open the markets of the world to U. S. farmers. Instead so much wheat, cotton, hogs and other farm products were flooded under or killed that the U. S. found it necessary to import millions of bushels of wheat and oats to supply this country's needs.

Instead of decreasing government expenses as promised, the administration has increased its expenditures 193 per cent.

Every time you draw a breath, Mr. Galon said, the government spends \$740. There are now 50 more government bureaus than when Roosevelt was inaugurated.

If all the incomes of \$5000 or more were confiscated by the United States it would not pay the running expenses of the government for six months.

Before his election the president said there was no danger of this nation going off the gold standard. Roosevelt was inaugurated March 4, 1932, and on April 13, 1932, this country did just that and the president, by a supine congress, was given authority to regulate the nation's money.

Roosevelt's closest advisers, the brain trust cabinet, have been trying to make this country over into an imitation of Russia for the past three years and a half and should Franklin Delano Roosevelt be re-elected it would be an indication that the people of the United States endorsed that communistic program.

Mr. Galore was introduced by Harry A. Slack, chairman of the Coos county republican central committee.

Bandon Schools to Open Soon

The Bandon school board is making arrangements to place school soon. The plan is to start the older elementary pupils in the high school building and to build six temporary class rooms in the gymnasium. The gymnasium will be provided with additional windows and doors. The starting date has not been set as yet.

All teachers are asked to report to Supt. Hartley so he will have their addresses.

All agencies are co-operating in an attempt to help Bandon recover in as far as possible from the recent tragedy.

Dr. C. A. Howard, state superintendent, phoned Martha E. Mulkey, county school superintendent, Wednesday. Mr. Howard has always been extremely interested in Coos county and is particularly in sympathy with the Bandon unfortunates at this time. He was leaving for Portland to confer with PWA and WPA heads in an effort to secure help for Bandon in getting children into school at once.

The Bandon school board and Supt. Hartley have been working most zealously in behalf of Bandon's school and in conferring with government agencies in an attempt to receive help.

Rural Schools Burn

Word has been received that at least four rural school buildings have been burned: Bear Creek District No. 62; Seaside No. 35 (at Merchants Beach); New Lake, No. 46, and Floras Creek, No. 39. The first two districts, however, were not using their buildings at the time, although they had retained their districts. Bear Creek had for several years transported their pupils to the Bandon school and Seaside had begun this plan this year.

Word had also been received unofficially that others have been destroyed but these reports have not been verified.

He was an employee on the Russ ranch across the river from lower Coquille.

Funeral services were conducted by Earl F. Downing at the Schroeder Bros. Mortuaries at 2:00 p. m. yesterday.

Mr. Bailey was born at Elk River, Minn., Nov. 17, 1874, and lacked but a month and a half of being 62 years of age.

He leaves a wife, Mrs. Allura Bailey, and two step sons.

Nickason's and back to Elmer Wilson's again Saturday till noon, when an urgent call came for the silo crew to fight fire at Crowley's, Krewson's, Christensen's and Alford's. They got there in time to save Crowley's buildings, Alford's buildings and Christensen's house which were right in the fire line. But Albert Christensen's barn and all outbuildings were burned, destroying all his stored myrtlewood, killing some of his goats and injuring some of his cows. The house stood so close to the other buildings that it seems a miracle that it was saved. The logging crew of forty or fifty men were brought out of the woods as soon as possible. Men from Dora were helping in the valley and in just an hour or two calls came that their services were needed around their own homes. The fire roared through the canyon taking all but two of the Kokeel Kanu Klub cabins and the old house that Obermans occupied until recently. With limbs, rocks and trees falling on the highway it was a risk for anyone to go through. The mail truck got through by 9:00 p. m., however.

J. D. Laird spent several days in Roseburg last week and when he had gotten well over the hump toward home he was told Brewster Valley was on fire and he couldn't get home. He went around by Myrtle Point and then couldn't get home. He stayed with his daughter, Mrs. Ed Abernathy at Dora.

Stories of the fire brought Mrs. Charles Seick and Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Seick, Jr., out to see how their cousins, the Kellers, were faring. It also brought Dave Crowley and Edwin Crowley from Oakland to see what they could do to help their folks.

False stories turned Binger Laird, of Roseburg, from the safe way—over the hump—to the long way to the valley Sunday.

Mrs. Harold Shepherd and daughters, Wilda and Colleen and Louis Laird and family went to Myrtle Point and come home by the Roseburg route after hearing that the fire was raging up Brummet creek where their homes are.

Kenneth and Ivan Laird risked the canyon and went to Fishtail late Sunday evening to get their bulldozer out of the fire zone. After walking seven or eight miles Ivan got home at 3:00 a. m. Monday.
