The students of Coquille high school were justly elated about their recent football victory over Marshfield high school. The last victory in 1916 occurred before any of this year's players had yet seen the light of day. Twenty years is a long time to wait for the recurrence of a football victory. A short assembly was held Monday morning to celebrate the event. Superintendent Lane, Mr. Osika and Coach Hatton were the speakers of the morning.

The football game with Bandon, scheduled for this afternoon, has been called off, so the Coquille team will have a week's rest, with daily practices, however.

The first class party of the school year will be held tonight when the senior class, faculty, and school board meetings will be invited to the "Senior Carnival," to be held in the high school auditorium. Committee heads responsible for the party are: Kenneth Waggoner, Audrey Taylor, Marcus Shelley.

Two freshman students transferred from Bandon high school during the past week. They are Everett Rhule and Hugo Stephan.

The home room appearance banner was awarded for the first school period to the library. Emma Frances Mulkey, room chairman, was in charge of room appearance.

Next Monday afternoon, a pay assembly will be held at the high school, under the auspices of the National Assemblies of San Francisco. Their program is entitled "Electrical Wonders." A fee of ten cents will be charged to defray expenses. Parents or friends of students who would care to attend are cordially invited.

The senior class won the first ticket sale and thereby acquired five points toward the interclass rivalry cup; the juniors were a close second with three points gained, and the sophomores scored one point for third place.

The Lions Club recently donated a silver cup to the high school to be inscribed after each football game with the name of the Coquille player who did the best blocking in that game. Jimmy Richmond earned this honor for the Reedsport game, and Ray Mattoon for the Marshfield game.

Three plays are being considered by the junior class. One will be selected for the junior class play to be given November 20. Miss Schaffer will direct the play. The committee selected to read the plays are Elaine Gray, Mary Robb, Annamae Holverstott, and Jim Richmond. The Coquille high school can well be proud of their new cafeteria. It is well equipped, lighted, and patronized.

The Marshfield high school with its new stucco presents a changed appearance.

The Charleston school has been embarrassed for room due to the increase in pupils. The board has increased the size of one room and built an addition to one.

John V. Hamblock Buried

John Vinton Hamblock, 70 years, one month and ten days of age, passed away at the Keizer hospital in North Bend early last Saturday morning, pneumonia being the cause of his demise.

Funeral services were conducted at the Schroeder Bros. Mortuaries here last Monday afternoon at two o'clock, by Rev. G. A. Gray, pastor of the Coquille M. E. church. Interment was in the old I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Mr. Hamblock was born in Missouri, Aug. 23, 1866, and had owned and conducted a ranch on the lower river, this way from Bear creek, for a great many years.

He leaves one daughter, Mrs. Earl Cochran, of Bandon, and a son, Jesse Hamblock, of Eastside. He is also survived by a sister, Mrs. Emma Drane, a brother, Eugene Hamblock, both of Bandon, and nine grandchildren.
