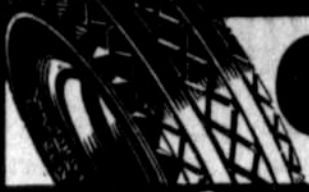

For STATE SENATOR, Republican

1. Long-time loan by the state of Oregon for reconstruction of the city of Bandon. Following the Astoria fire of 1922 the state provided \$500,000 for rebuilding—largely through the efforts of State Senator James W. Mott. It can be done with the right man in office.

2. Federal tax on all nationally-owned timberlands in Coos and Curry counties and in Oregon, to be paid to the counties and to the state. These taxes are paid by private owners and should be paid likewise by the United States. The nation owns 51 per cent of the acreage of Oregon.

3. A policy of no promises to any minority group.

4. Steps to prevent diverting of state gasoline tax funds into other channels. Coos and Curry counties need state help in secondary highway improvement. Gasoline tax moneys must be kept for this purpose.
