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City Council Session

At the city council session Monday evening the city recorder was instructed to reply to the county court's inquiry as to whether Coquille would pay for the juice consumed in the new lighting system around the court house block which has been contracted for by the county, that the city would pay the light bill. The system will be the same as is being installed in the business district.

The city engineer's estimate that it would require an expenditure of \$6,175 to make water main changes as far back as the court house to provide an eight-inch supply for the Arrow Mill Co. plant's proposed overhead sprinkling system, was laid on the table to ascertain what the mill company wanted to do in the matter.

The application of Carter avenue residents, up at the northeast corner of Coquille, for three street lights was referred to the light committee with power to act.

The application of Church of God representatives that it be relieved of paying the \$300 to \$400 assessed against it for Henry street paving was denied by the council, the mayor stating that the council had no authority for so doing. Whether an attempt will be made to sell the property, or permit the city to take it over for the delinquent street improvement assessment, has not been decided by the few members of the congregation who still remain here.

Upon the council ordering the city engineer to proceed, when weather permits, to put a larger drain under the fill on Sixth street, between Taylor and Hall, Mrs. Laura Brandon agreed to pay the delinquent street assessment against her lot here. A former city engineer had used so small a culvert and placed it where it was of no practical use in draining the land to the east of it that Mrs. Brandon's lot was covered with water the greater part of the year.

Non-High School Attendance

According to a Non-High school report prepared by the secretary, Martha E. Mulkey, 496 students were enrolled in the high schools in the county during the last year. Of this number four hundred forty-one were transported on buses, paid 3c a mile one way toward transportation or \$8.00 toward board. The average cost of transportation per child per year was found to be \$43.32.

One hundred forty-one non-high school students were enrolled in the Marshfield school, 119 in North Bend, 76 in Myrtle Point Union high school, 63 in Coquille, 48 in Coos River, 42 in Bandon, 11 in Riverton Union high school and three in Lakeside.

The Non-High school board is made up of five directors, one from each of the five zones which are designated by law. Each year one director is elected by the people of his own particular zone but he serves on the board at large. The tax rate for schooling children outside of high school districts under the system as set up by the Non-High school district law is a little higher in Coos than under the old tuition method, but under the new law a much larger number of children are being provided means of getting to and from school.

Gardeners to Assemble at O.S.C.

A vegetable growers' conference will be held at the Oregon State College on November 16, 17 and 18, according to information contained in a conference program received at the county agent's office for distribution to farmers of Coos county interested in gardening.

This conference will be divided into three divisions—on the first day, soils, fertilizers, and irrigation will be discussed by specialists in the various fields; on the second day, insect pests, diseases, and rodents which are important to the vegetable growers will be stressed; on the third day of the conference, various crops and marketing of these crops will be considered by growers throughout the state and by specialists in the various fields covered.

A new feature of the conference this year, according to the program, will be an exhibit of the equipment and supplies used by vegetable growers in soils, fertilizers, irrigation, plant growing, insect and disease control, etc., and a plant clinic will be conducted on the second day.

A program showing the features of the conference in detail can be secured at the county agricultural agent's office.

WPA Home Building Not Confined to Indigents

The story that the WPA intended to build only houses for indigents is denied by E. J. Griffith, state WPA administrator, who writes the Western World in part as follows:

"We are not planning to build any residences or make any arrangements whatever for caring for the indigent at Bandon. Such an arrangement would place an unnecessary burden upon those of your citizens who are actually working and able to contribute to rebuilding industry there. People without money, without resources and without jobs must be taken care of in some other way and at some other place.

"What we do plan is to provide temporary accommodations for those citizens of Bandon who have jobs at Bandon but are financially unable to build homes for themselves at this time. Bandon citizens who have regular jobs at Bandon should be left there to assist in rebuilding the industrial life of the city. Many of these people with jobs, however, are without sufficient money or credit at this time to build their homes through the usual channels of bank or building and loan assistance. These are the people WPA proposes to help.

"Other citizens of Bandon who have operated their own small concerns—perhaps a restaurant or a shoe repair shop—may have sufficient capital to rebuild and start again their business activities but cannot provide homes for themselves in addition. These people likewise must be helped so that they can remain in your city and aid in its rebuilding.

"I think you will agree with me that this is a proper program. I think you will also agree with me that those citizens of Bandon, if there be any, who either by themselves unaided or with the assistance of some regularly established industrial activity, such as a bank, building and loan association or a mill, are able to rebuild their homes without government aid, should be required to do so and the available money all spent to the end that those workers who otherwise might be forced to leave your city will be enabled to remain and engage in useful work."

Ninth Bandon Victim Found

The remains of Jay C. Ashton, Bandon resident who had not been seen since the fire on Sept. 26, were found last Sunday by an organized band of volunteers who had met for that purpose. The body was found about a quarter of a mile south of where his home had stood and east of the Bradley lake road. Search in that direction had not been made before because it was toward the advancing flames that he walked. A dense thicket of furze had stood where the body was found.

Positive identification was made by the dead man's son, Wilford 22, who recognized the watch and other metal articles lying beside the burned body.

Mr. Ashton was the ninth victim of the Bandon fire known to have lost his life.
