owner were found 20 feet from one end with arms, legs and head burned off.

An autopsy revealed a bullet hole in the back and the bullet was found just below the base of the skull in the neck. Pathological examination revealed it had been fired from a 25-35 Winchester and the metal part of that gun was later found in the ashes of the barn and hay.

Eventually Sam located the spot where the murderer had stood and fired through some gooseberry bushes as his brother leaned over, broken twigs showing the downward path of the bullet and the murderer then told how he had killed his brother "accidentally" and had then started for the Deschutes river to drown himself. But a thought came to him, "He always said he wanted to be cremated and his ashes scattered over the farm," so he dragged the body 200 feet to the barn and set the latter on fire.




