He had made his home on practically the same ranch in West Norway since a small lad, for sixty-one years. He loved music and was an artist in his own right on the violin. Several years ago at a basketball dinner he and his brother, Ed, kept the audience highly entertained with their violins. Bert used his left hand for the bow and Ed, his right hand. Old settlers can recall when the Myers boys had a stringed quartette of their own and friends would gather from miles away to enjoy their music. Bert as well as several of his brothers spent many years on the river boats. He was an engineer. While he had not been in the best of health for several years his final passing was a severe shock to even those closest to him. Death was due to heart failure. He made his home with Mr. and Mrs. John Myers, who were close neighbors of another brother, Ed. L. A. Myers and his family have a house in Arago not three miles from them. A sister, Mrs. Jesse Clinton, lives near Myrtle Point and the youngest brother, Ralph, also lives near Myrtle Point. Many nieces and nephews also survive. He had never married.
