Albert Powers Heads New Livestock Organization

Albert H. Powers, of Powers, was selected to head the Western Oregon Livestock association when directors of county livestock associations met in Roseburg on January 6. B. F. Nichols of Douglas county, will serve the organization as vice president and R. M. Knox, county agent in Curry county, as secretary.

All livestock producers who are members of county livestock associations will automatically become members of the Western Oregon Association and will be represented in organization meetings by the directors of the county units. Each county is to have one vote regardless of the number of directors. Livestock producers in other counties in western Oregon which do not have county organizations are also eligible to affiliate.

The purposes of the new livestock organization as set forth in its by-laws, are to work for a greater development of the livestock industry and to promote better methods of production and marketing. It may affiliate with other generally similar organizations at any time such action should seem to serve the livestock interests to better advantage.

The executive committee of this organization, consisting of one representative from each county, met in Coquille on Saturday, January 9, to complete the plan of organization and consider a program of work for the immediate future.

A. G. Marsters, executive committee member from Douglas county, was selected to represent the organization at a meeting of the Oregon Wool Growers association held in Ontario early this week. A resolution was passed also through which the state legislature will be urged to again appropriate sufficient funds to match funds appropriated by counties for predatory animal control.

Tourist Travel Up 40 Per Cent

Secretary of State Earl Snell announces that the increase in tourist registrations in 1936 exceeded the previous year by 40 per cent. This is an even greater pick-up in registration of 100,300 cars in the preceding year. Final 1936 tabulations are still being received from registrars throughout the state, but an increase of at least 40,000 non-resident cars is indicated in present reports.

The month of December alone brought an increase of approximately 1800 registrations, with the total reaching 5200.

It is important that all livestock interests or men who operate on range land should attend this meeting, states Frank Van Leuven, president of the association, since considerable attention will be given to efforts which are being made at this time to bring about a better use of the cut-over land in this section. The County Livestock association has affiliated with the Western Oregon Livestock association and reasons for this action by the directors will be explained in the meeting it is stated.

In addition to the discussion on methods of bringing about better use of the cut-over land including burning brush, seeding, etc., attention will be given to a WPA project which is now in operation in the county in draining seepy areas for liverlute control. Predatory animal control and the 1937 range improvement program are other subjects for discussion.
