

Each county is to have one vote regardless of the number of directors. Livestock producers in other counties in western Oregon which do not have county organizations are also eligible to affili-

The purposes of the new livestock organization as set forth in its by-aws, are to work for a greater develpment of the livestock industry and o promote better methods of producion and marketing. It may affiliate vith other generally similar organiations at any time such action should eem to serve the livestock interests o better advantage.
