The installation of machinery is under way at full speed at the new plant of the Bandon Cheese & Produce company, which will open for business Saturday of this week. 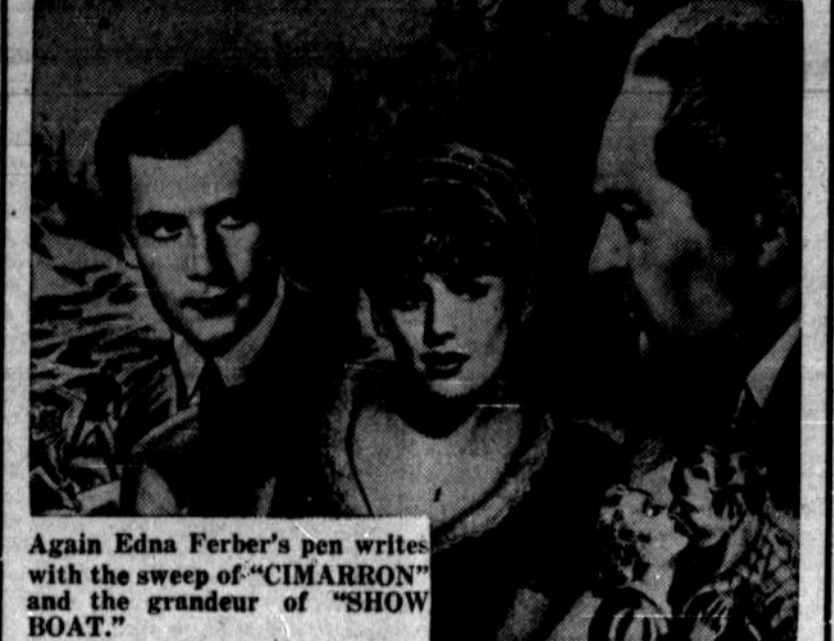
