Largest Damage Award in Coos

The \$30,000 judgment secured by William Kerns, Coos Bay youth, against Chas. O. King and Gorst & King, is the largest damage judgment ever recorded in Coos county for personal injuries, according to the recollection of court house officials and attorneys of the county. That was the amount named by the jury which rendered its verdict last Friday afternoon.

Young Kerns has lost the use of his leg and may eventually lose the leg as a result of the motorcycle collision with the bus last March on the Empire to Charleston road. He sued for \$50,000.

Clyde D. Lovell, driver of the motorcycle, who suing for \$3,000, was awarded a \$400 judgment.

Both cases were heard by the same jury by agreement between the attorneys and the court.

L. A. Liljeqvist, defense attorney, announced that the larger judgment would be appealed. J. B. Bedingfield represented the plaintiff in each case.
