Bandon Property Pool Being Well Signed Up
(Western World)

Barring some unforeseen happening, Bandon's co-operative property pool, organized for the purpose of making it possible to relocate the business district in view of rebuilding Bandon on a model, planned, basis, has promise of approaching 100 per cent participation by property holders in the city.

While the actual signature of Coos county has not been obtained, Bandon has the assurance of the county court that, barring any legal restrictions, the county will participate in the pool. The agreement is now in the hands of District Attorney Ben Fluxel and as soon as the legality of action is determined the county will offer its signature.

Considering the county as favorable to the pool the amount of property already signed amounts to practically 75 per cent, which is sufficient, according to the terms of the agreement, to make the agreements binding. But all the property owners have not had a chance to sign and the rolls will be kept open to give everyone a chance. It is hoped by the Citizens Rebuilding Commission that the signing will be 100 per cent as this would have an important bearing on the legislature and congress in consideration of measures aimed to help Bandon in its rehabilitation program.

It is only necessary to sign the agreement. Presentation of deeds and abstracts are not necessary at this time. Only deeds to property actually exchanged in the final relocation of the business district will be required, and such property not falling within the new business district will immediately revert to the original owners if they desire to retain it.

Misunderstandings have resulted from some news stories about the pool, appearing in outside papers. One Portland newspaper this week carried a story to the effect that property has been "deeded" to the property pool. This would imply that deeds are necessary at this time.

The article also stated that "when 75 per cent of the city's property owners have deeded their land to the pool, through a bank acting as trustee, the pool will by agreement, and the vote of the 75 per cent will force other landowners to comply with wishes of the majority."

That also is untrue; the agreements become effective when 75 per cent of the area of the city is signed up, but the property of those not signing will not be affected by the pool. There is no intention to force the will of the majority upon those of the minority; the aim being to make it voluntary and co-operative and those who sign will be in position to benefit in the event their property comes into the exchange, while those who do not sign may find themselves at a disadvantage in the newly platted town. For instance, should the route of the highway through town be changed, those now on the highway would be entitled to comparable locations on the new route, if they sign the agreement, otherwise the citizens rebuilding commission would be under no obligations to them.

President's Ball Next Saturday

The President's Birthday Ball will be held jointly by Coquille and Myrtle Point in the latter city, Saturday, January 30, in the V. F. W. hall. Music will be furnished by Don Estes and his orchestra.

The committee in charge was unable to secure a suitable hall for that evening in Coquille and it was decided to merge the two dances. Seventy per cent of the proceeds go to the local infantile paralysis trust fund and thirty per cent to the Georgia Warm Springs foundation.

This money goes for a very worthy cause and everyone is urged to attend if possible. Tickets are 75 cents for gentlemen and 25 cents for ladies. Tickets may be purchased at H. S. Norton's Music shop, from Andy Anderson at Hudson Drug Store, and of Frank Martin at the Penney Store.

The local committee consists of Frank W. Martin, J. E. Axtell, J. A. Fitzpatrick, Andy Anderson, George Tracy Leach, H. P. Hornish, Theo. L. Clinton, H. S. Norton and Elbert Schroeder, general chairman.
