

number of soil building practices, including the seeding of perennial legumes, biennial legumes, perennial grasses, mixtures of perennial and biennial legumes and perennial grasses. eseeding farm pastures and meadows, plowing under green manure crops, perennial noxious weed control, applying superphosphate, liming the soil, and other practices which

may not apply in this section. It is possible, local committeemen believe, for a farmer to receive greater benefits under the 1937 program than during previous years. Where payments for liming soil amounted to \$2.50 per acre last year, the allowance for this practice will be \$3 per ton

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
