# Dog Ordinance to Be Enforced After March 15

## (Continued from Page One)

Coos County, Oregon, and any such dogs or dogs shall be deemed to be running at large when outside of any running at large when outside of any proper enclosure sufficient to retain such dog or dogs, and it shall be the duty of the Marshal to execute said order

Section 2. Any person or persons violating the provisions of the fore-going section of this ordinance, upon conviction thereof before the City Recorder of said City shall be fined in a sum not less than One Dollar nor more than Twenty Dollars.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the City Marshal, or such other person as he or the Common Council may appoint, to seize and impound any and all dogs found running at large within the corporate limits of said City. Upon seizing any such dog or dogs said Marshal or other person seizing the same shall immediately seizing the same main immediately impound the same in some suitable place to be provided therefor, and shall immediately give notice thereof by posting notice in three public by posting notice in three public places within the corporate limits of said City for a period of five days. Such notice shall describe such dog or dogs with such reasonable certainty as may be done, and shall give notice to the owner or other person interested that at the expiration of said are days stating the cay cartain. that such dog or dogs will be sold at blic auction. At the time specified in such notice the Marshal or such other person having said dog or dogs in charge, shall sell at public auction to the highest bidder for cash in hand at time of sale. All such sales shall be made at the front door of the City Hall between the hours of ten o'clock in the forenoon and four o'clock in the afternoon. In case there shall not be a sum bid at such sale sufficient to pay the costs and charges of impounding, keeping and selling such

dogs or dogs, the City Recorder shall bid the same in for and on behalf of the City of Coquille, for such sum as may be necessary to pay the costs and charges of impounding, keeping and selling such dog or dogs, and thereupon, the said City Recorder shall order the Marshal to kill such proper enclosure sufficient to retain such dog or dogs, unless such dog or dogs shall be led by a rope, chain or other secure fastening. Section 2: Any person or persons for the massing of the massing the charges for impounding each dog shall be One Dollar, for selling the same One Dollar, and for keeping the same while it is impounded whatever sum, not exceeding Twenty-five Cents per day, as may be necessary

to properly feed such dog. Section 4. Whereas, the ordinances now in force in said City are inefficient and dogs have become so numerous upon the streets, private and public ways that they constitute a public nuisance, destroy property and endanger the safety of the public, and for that reason it is declared that an emergency exists and that it is important and necessary for the fore-going ordinance to become immedi-

immediate preservation of the peace, health and safety of the said City that the foregoing ordinance become immediately operative, and the same shall become immediately operative upon its approval by the affirmative members elected to the commo council, taken by ayes and noes, and


its approval by the mayor.
