Mrs. Isle Edinger, of Empire, is visiting for a short time with Mr. and Mrs. John Myers.

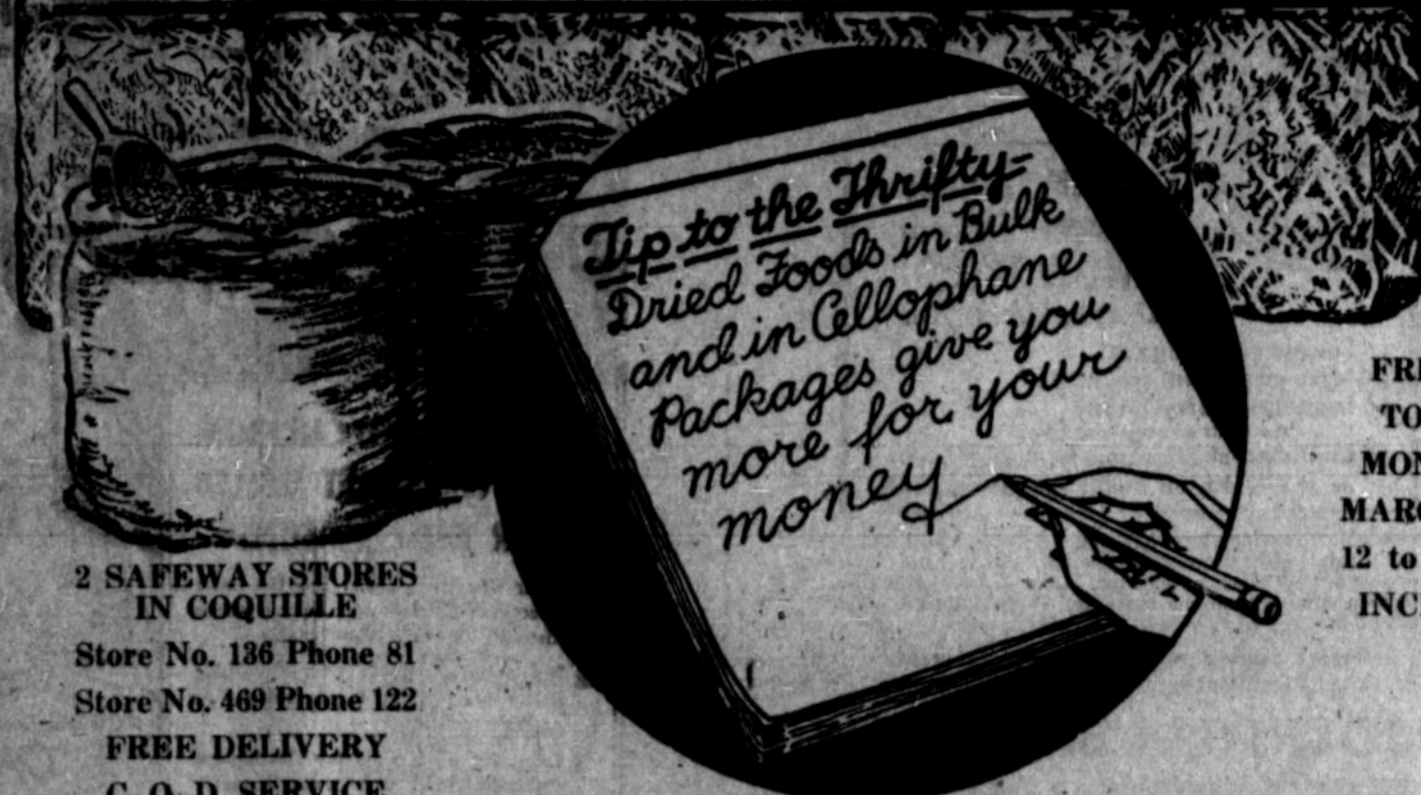
Mrs. Daisy Doyle is enjoying a visit from her only sister, Rose, from Camas Valley.
