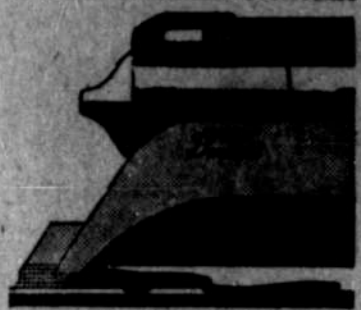


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Guard Match Secrets

"Rocky" Peterson, whom Mr. Fortier also placed at Yakima, went through here on the bus last Monday morning at three o'clock to join the crew at training camp.

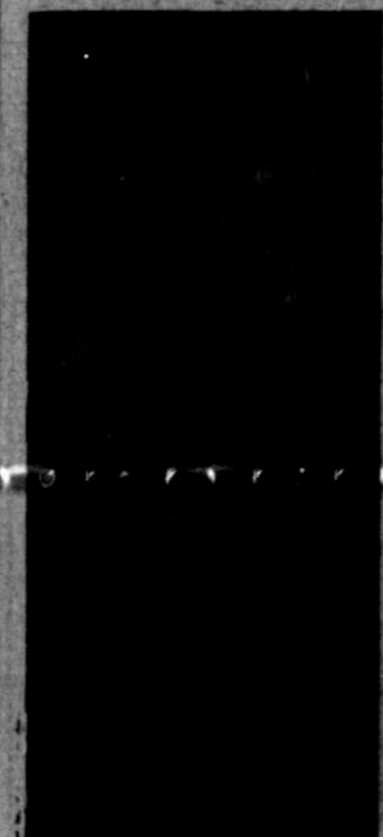

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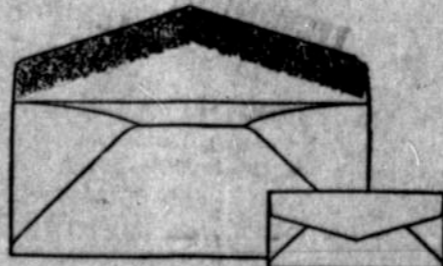
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
