"Sneak"

Saturday, April 24, at seven o'clock seven seniors, (Maxyne Martin was unable to go) — Geraldine Gilbert, Harriet Miller, Clarissa Fellows, June Danielson, Lee Cox, John Heffley and Ole Chard—Miss Opal Robison, grade school teacher, and Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Robinson left Riverton on the annual senior "sneak." Miss Opal Robison took her car and was assisted in the driving by John Heffley. Mr. and Mrs. Robinson took shifts at the wheel of their car.

The group ate a picnic lunch at noon near the Wolf Creek Tavern south of Azalea, took a number of pictures, and then proceeded to Grants Pass where they looked over the displays in the Chamber of Commerce Building. Across the street they ordered pop and marveled at the dexterity with which a totally blind man took care of his tiny confectionery and news stand without the help of any one.

In the early afternoon the two Riverton cars headed for Crater Lake. The trip was very enjoyable and unusual inasmuch as in the upper altitude both sides of the highway were stacked with snow that in many places towered over twice as high as the cars. At the entrance to the National park the ranger informed the group that the snow was 8 1/2 feet on the level and ran over 13 feet high in the average places along the road. The ten visitors had a real treat when viewing the blue waters of the lake from the tops of the snow banks.

In the early evening the cars left for Klamath Falls. After some shopping and dining there, travel was resumed to Ashland. On this leg of the journey the Wayne-Robinson Dodge presented the tired and hurried passengers with a nice blow-out. "All hands were drafted," and the change was completed in less than ten minutes.

At 10:30 o'clock the Wayne Robinson car reached the New Ashland Hotel where it found the other carload waiting. A. community kitchen now contains a cook stove, two large coffee pots, 1 1/2 dozen restaurant mugs,

two dish pans, three dozen silver-plated teaspoons, and a large kitchen cabinet for storing the equipment. More equipment will be added as additional funds are available. For this purpose the P. T. A. is sponsoring a dance in the very near future.
