Battle Royal Had Cash Customers Up in the Ring

A crowd which crammed every square foot of the Community Building saw the rip roaring spectacle ever witnessed in Coquille last Friday when Promoter Harry Elliott staged his spectacular battle royal. Few there were who could see all the action going on in the ring after the five wrestlers and the referee started out at the stroke of the timekeeper's gong. The ringsiders scurried back away from the ring as wrestlers were tossed over the ropes and landed in the vicinity of fair ladies' laps. The whole thing was a wild melee of flying bodies and swinging rights and lefts. Wrestlers kicked and flailed at each other willy nilly.

Thor Jensen was the first victim, and being a home town boy he was picked on in a big way. Somebody put Thor's head in the ropes and he was almost suffocated before the

referee could disentangle him and drag him out of the ring. That left the Scotchman McDonald McDougall, Knute Franklin, Mickey McGuire and Otis Clingman in the ring. Clingman

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was hurled clear of the ropes and the Scotchman and Franklin beat him down and pinned him. Otis returned to the ring and Sonnenburged the tar out of the two meanies while the crowd roared its appreciation. But it was two against one, and while Franklin held the Oklahoma City boy in a full Nelson hold, McDonald-McDougall cracked him with full rights to the jaw. Otis collapsed and was rescued by the referee.

Then after a five-minute rest Franklin found himself facing the Scotchman for the final thirty-minute bout to determine the winner of the battle royal.

If the first ten minutes of the battle royal was fast and rough, the remaining 18 minutes between the two survivors was really wild. No time was wasted in finesse or science. The men stood toe to toe until Franklin broke cover and ran out of the ring.

From then on it was about as even and as wild a match as could be seen in a blue moon. After staggering Franklin with a powerful right the Scotchman clamped on his terrific backbreaker hold and was awarded the fall by the referee.

As referee Elliott helped Franklin to his feet after the match, the Highlander made as if to aid his stricken opponent but instead lifted him high above his head and slammed the nearly unconscious Portlander to the canvas and Referee Elliott, promptly reversed his decision and awarded the fall and match to Franklin. The McDonald person attempted to assault the referee but the crowd put an end to that.

In one of the hottest preliminaries ever seen in southwestern Oregon, Tommy Tassas, the Chicago Greek, took one fall from Bobby Roberts, of North Bend.

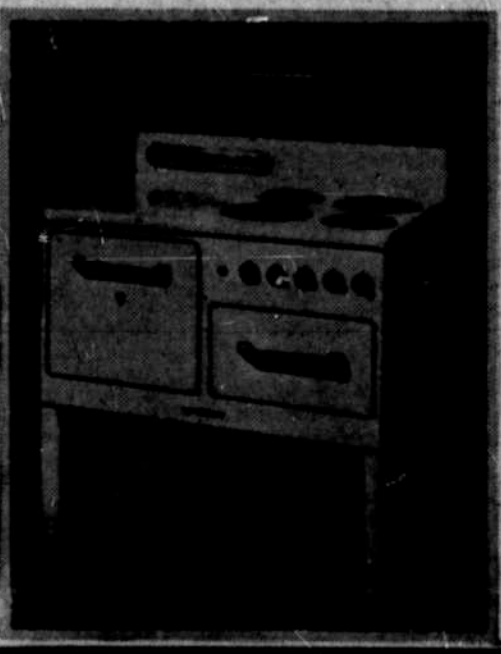
