DINING ROOMS are becoming more versatile every day, it seems. Time was when their main function was to bring the family together at meal time. Today, with greater use being made of available space, we find dining rooms serving as centers for reading, studying, card games, and other family pursuits, as well.

These varying demands upon the dining room are bringing with them added provisions for the eyes. Lighting that may be ample for cutting a steak may be insufficient for cutting a dress from a mail-order pattern, reading the fine print of a newspaper, or adding columns of figures.

And so we find an increasing number of smart new dining room lighting fixtures appearing on the market. Not only do these new units harmonize with any decorative scheme; they are capable of providing

ing varying amounts of light for different seeing requirements. Many of them use the new three-light bulbs, which give three different amounts of light from one bulb, at successive turns of the switch. When the fixture has a glass bowl, like the one shown in the accompanying illustration, most of the light is sent to the table (where it belongs!), while the other parts of the room are softly and subtly lit.

Fixtures of this type please the lighting whims of both the hostess, who likes to include lighted candles in the table setting, and the host who dislikes dimness.

If your dining room has one of the older type of candle-unit fixtures, you can modernize it and make it more attractive by replacing amber, flame-shaped bulbs with 40-watt inside-frosted lamps, and shielding them with parchment shades of the slip-on variety. These shades are pleasing in appearance, and, at the same time, banish glare and soften the light for dining.

Nearly 60 Living Descendants

A lady who came to Coquille when it was nothing but a small settlement on the bank of the Coquille river and practically all of the present town site was covered with forest, still lives in Newberg and the list of her descendants was recently published in an issue of the Scribe of that city. Henry Cardwell, of Coquille, is a son of that pioneer settler, Mrs. Susan Cardwell, and three of her grandchildren—William, Daniel and Fairy Susan Cardwell—also live here.

Mrs. Cardwell came to Coquille in 1873 and lived here for five or six years. She and her husband first lived in a little log cabin that stood where Norcott's Studio is now located. Later they moved to a frame house on the present Safeway site, and her husband owned the first Coquille livery stable, on the present Gould Furniture store site.

Geo. Moulton enters into the story of this pioneer family's few years in Coquille for it is reported that he shed real tears when he ran a foot race with and was defeated by one of Mrs. Cardwell's daughters.

Following are excerpts from the Scribe's recent article about Mrs. Cardwell:

Mrs. Susan Cardwell, who lives with her daughter, Mrs. J. G. Dicks, here may well be scornful when she reads in the papers of family reunions at which are gathered children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, and great-great-grandchildren, even when the great-greats, as is sometimes the case, number six or eight. As far as great-greats are concerned, anything less than a two-digit figure representing the number of great-great-grandchildren is of little consequence, for she has 16 great-great-grandchildren.

The first generation of her descendants, of which there were eight, now includes three: Mrs. Dicks, Ed Cardwell, and Henry Cardwell. Of the second generation, her grandchildren, 14 are still living; her great grandchildren number 28, and her great-great-grandchildren are 16 in number.

Mrs. Cardwell, who will be 90 years of age September 14, came to Oregon from Iowa in the summer of 1852 when she was five years of age. Her parents settled in Douglas county, later moving to Jackson county, where on October 22, 1865, she married Zachariah Cardwell, who has been dead for 27 years. Since his death Mrs. Cardwell has lived with Mrs. Dicks.

Mr. Currie was born in Harpurhey, Ontario, Nov. 6, 1847, and came to the United States with his parents, settling in Minnesota, at the age of 12. On Dec. 28, 1871, he was united in marriage to Miss Mary Evelyn Walker, at Rushford, Minn. They resided there until 1884 when they moved to North Dakota and came further west, to Coquille in 1925. He followed in his father's footsteps as a merchant until he retired from active business while living in North Dakota.

He is survived by one son, John A. Currie, of Missoula, Mont., and two daughters, Mrs. Kunz, and Mrs. Grace Phelan, of Bowman, N. D. Also by four grandsons and one great grandson.

One grandson, J. C. Phelan, accompanied by his bride, from Aberdeen, Wash., was the only out-of-town relative able to be here for the services. They arrived Sunday evening at the Kunz home, 15 minutes after Mr. Currie passed away, not knowing that he was seriously ill.

Mr. Currie was a member of the Masonic lodge and of the Eastern Star, the Masons conducting services Tuesday at the grave.

He was one of God's noblemen, a real gentleman, always kindly and courteous, and of unfailing good nature. He will be missed by all the friends and acquaintances who were always glad to see him when his health permitted his coming down town.
