Leslie A. Kime writes the Sentinel from his home in Los Angeles:

"Los Angeles is having a spell of weather very much like Coos county. It rained a little last night and we have had high fog and very little sun for several days. It is very cold for this time of the year. I tell people here it is good for the Oregon ducks that happen to be living in Los Angeles. Southern California has had 22.14 inches of rain to date. And they think that is a lot here.

"I wish people in Coquille could see the Grand Central market here. They have from 75,000 to 125,000 customers every day and all the food is carried out under arms or in shopping bags. One can buy nearly every kind of food he wants there. At one of the stalls which handles cheese I saw cheese from Norway, Denmark, Holland, Switzerland, England, Italy, France and Spain and also from our leading cheese states. But one of their best sellers is the Tillamook brand.
