County Supt. Tells Who**May Vote Next Monday**

The law as to qualifications of voters passed by the 1937 State Legislature will not affect persons in voting on clerks and director on Monday, June 21. This property qualification has never been required for voting on these officers. The only qualifications required are these: that the voter shall be at least 21 years of age, a citizen of the state and have lived in the district for at least 30 days immediately preceding the election. A foreigner can not vote unless he has taken out his final papers.

Who Can Vote on Budget
The law which was amended by the last legislature pertains to the voting on all other matters in third class districts than the election of clerk and director. No more can the head of family vote on budget, etc., without the property qualification.

Under the new law, the requirement for voters in first, second and third class districts is now the same. In each, in order to vote on any matter other than election of clerk and director, the voter must have the following qualifications besides the regular qualifications required for voting on officers: Must have property in the district as shown by the last county assessment, and not assessed by the sheriff, on which he or she is liable to pay a tax; or to present to the directors or judges of election satisfactory evidence that he or she has stock, shares, or ownership in any corporation, firm or copartnership which has property in the district, as shown by the last county assessment and not assessed by the sheriff, on which such corporation, firm or copartnership pays a tax even though his or her individual name in this case does not appear upon the tax roll.
