It Was a Wild Main Event Here Wednesday

Hector versus Achilles outside the walls of Troy, Pickett's charge at the battle of Gettysburg, the capture of the Argonne Forest by the marines—that was war. But mat addicts at Coquille's Community Building Wednesday night saw one of the most torrid battles ever fought out within the four corners of a squared ring. And that was the bout between one Scotty, "Ding Dong" McDougall and a sleek, ebony colored gladiator called the Black Panther. It was surely the wildest fracas yet seen in the Community Building, bettering the days of Jack Lipcomb and Bulldog Jackson at their wildest, and going several steps farther in the art of mayhem than most fans thought possible.

To begin at the beginning, the Scotch mutilation artist came out to make short work of the Panther and came very near to curtailing the activities of both the Panther and Referee Elliott for the entire evening. McDougall clamped on his strangle hold on the Panther's throat and when Referee Elliott broke the hold, the Scotch villain socked the unprepared official squarely on the button knocking him over the top rope and into the laps of the second row spectators. As Elliott pulled himself back to the edge of the ring, McDougall kicked him in the solar plexus, again landing him back among the rear ringsiders. The Scotchman proceeded to choke the colored boy down to the mat, plugging his eyes and ears with his fingers. Spectators revived the Panther and Elliott.

After ten minutes of confusion and milling around on the part of the audience, Referee Elliott declared that there had been no fall, inasmuch as he was outside of the ring, and the men returned to the ring to do battle. Here the colored gladiator showed marvelous recuperative powers. He sailed into the Highlander with battle flags flying. Three minutes later the ebony jaguar put three flying whip wrist locks on the Ding Dong man that spelled his defeat for the first fall.

But McDougall was not through by any means for after eight minutes in the second fall he again had the dark boy in a bad way, but he made the mistake of again trying to take the referee too. As the Scotchman, with an imperious gesture, threw Elliott over the top rope and out on the floor, the Panther grabbed McDougall in a

whip wristlock that threw him eight feet straight up into the air. McDougall's body actually hit the suspended flood light over the mat and caused the light to swing crazily out over the ropes. The force which tossed the Scotch maniac eight feet straight up into the air ended the match in the Panther's favor, leaving McDougall out cold on the mat.

The two preceding bouts on the card were scarcely less exciting. Kenna, in the semi final, took the first and last falls in a surprise victory over Dorry Detton. Wild Bill outroughed Dorry in the latter minutes of a bout which lasted 44 of the 45 scheduled minutes.

In a beautifully wrestled preliminary bout Mickey McGuire took one fall in 26 minutes from Freddie Knuckles of Memphis, Tenn.

Harry Elliott announced that he had signed up the great Jiu Jitsu master, Tetsura Higgami, for a bout in Coquille in the near future. The next wrestling card in Coquille will be on the 30th of June.

Powers-Agness Road to Be Opened by July 1

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use. There are three overnight camps on this road between Powers and the ridge above Agness, as well as three already developed picnic spots.

The first picnic spot is at Coal creek, about seven miles from town where rustic tables, an out-of-door cooking place and a shelter are available. The second picnic spot is from Coal creek, both an overnight camp and picnic grounds are available, and the trail to Elk falls has been cleared so that these falls, a few hundred feet from the road, are easily accessible. The falls are in two parts, each with a sheer drop of 50 to 60 feet, and while the volume of water coming over the cliff lessens during the summer, they are well worth seeing.

Daphne grove, 15 miles from Powers, has been improved and developed during the past winter. The community shelter has been remodeled, and repairs made to the six overnight camping spaces, each with room to park the family car. There are about nine picnic places scattered about the grounds, each with its cooking unit, rustic table and benches. Water piped from Squaw creek furnishes an adequate supply for personal use as well as for cooking purposes.

Across from the grove is the government experiment station at what is known as the Husposka place. Here 9,000 acres of Port Orford cedar have been set aside for experimental work. Ways and means of propagation, utilization of the wood and of securing a satisfactory method of sustained yield are studied, with the idea of perpetuating the growth of this valuable wood.

A new bridge across the Coquille leads to this station which is under the direction of the Pacific Northwest Experiment station and visitors are welcome at the office. Telephone service connects the station with the world outside. Selective logging was practiced on this tract last year, and the best methods of logging as well as of wood utilization are being studied, in addition to satisfactory propagation methods.

Another camp, Myrtle grove, which has been developed the last year, offers the same picnic and overnight comforts as does Daphne grove and it is planned to increase the capacity of the camps as soon as practicable. At China Flat the Forest Service maintains a guard station, but the barracks and other buildings built for use of the CCC units have not been occupied since last summer when a skeleton crew for road work was stationed there.

Just above Daphne grove, recreational trails to two different falls have been cleared during the past winter, opening up these beauty spots to forest lovers. These falls are on the Coquille river, and have been known respectively as First and Second falls. Because it was hard to get to them, few people other than seasoned hikers have heretofore visited them, but on the first Sunday the new trails were open in May, 20 people viewed these beauty spots. A third falls is as yet almost inaccessible from traveling up the river, but is more easily reached from the Eden Valley side.

The road from Powers to Agness is about 37 miles long, there are no oversteep grades, the road is scenic throughout its entire length, running as it does through the canyon of the south fork of the Coquille river in the Siskiyou National forest. At the "Big Bridge" the road leaves the river and climbs upward to Rock creek and on the ridge above the Rogue, when it drops down into that river valley. It is on this ascent that a few fairly steep grades are met. Until the river road down the Rogue to Gold Beach is finished, it will not be possible to make a loop trip; that remains for the future. Good forest camps, offering the same services as those constructed by the Forest service on this side of the bridge, are

Oh, for the life of a circus clown, cavorting about the "big top," seeing the world and the extensive traveling circus clowns do each season, the excitement and the glamour of the circus and its environments, often have attracted many young men who have been ambitious to become a circus clown, so we recite a little story about a circus clown and his entree into the realms of rumbling red wagons, blaring bands and tooting calliopes. That clown is none other than Charles Robinson, feature clown of the famous Robbins big 3 ring wild animal circus and Buck Steele's Hollywood Stars which come to Coquille on Thursday, July 1, for an afternoon and night performance at the Base Ball park.

"Take my advice and follow some other vocation in life than that of being a clown with a circus. Not that it isn't a respectable and honorable medium of earning a livelihood nor that your associations are other than highly refined, for circus people, in my estimation, are the kindest and most thoughtful of all show folks—and as to morality, well that is of the highest classification.

"I have been a circus clown for some fifteen years, following a youthful ideal and ambition. I have been a success, as far as circus clowns are concerned, but a failure to my folks and their earlier plans in my behalf. I started as an "apprentice" clown with the Sun Bros. circus fifteen years ago and gradually have worked my way to the exalted position as "producing clown," or "head clown" of the Robbins circus, but the road to "fame" was far from a rosy one, I can assure anyone whose ambitions lean towards becoming a "circus joy."

"I have succeeded because I have studied the reaction of my work upon the audience and the audience is the pulse and barometer of a clown's weekly pay envelope and his advance in the art of 'clowning.' I have perfected the stunts and tricks and pranks we clowns indulge in but after careful thought and consideration, always bearing in mind that timely topics and characters of cartoons and prominence are best adaptable to a circus clown's popularity and success

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of his stunts. But to be frank and honest, I would rather be president of a railroad or some large corporation than a circus clown—not because I don't enjoy my work and find it interesting, but just between you and me he makes more money—and there is more worry to clowning!
