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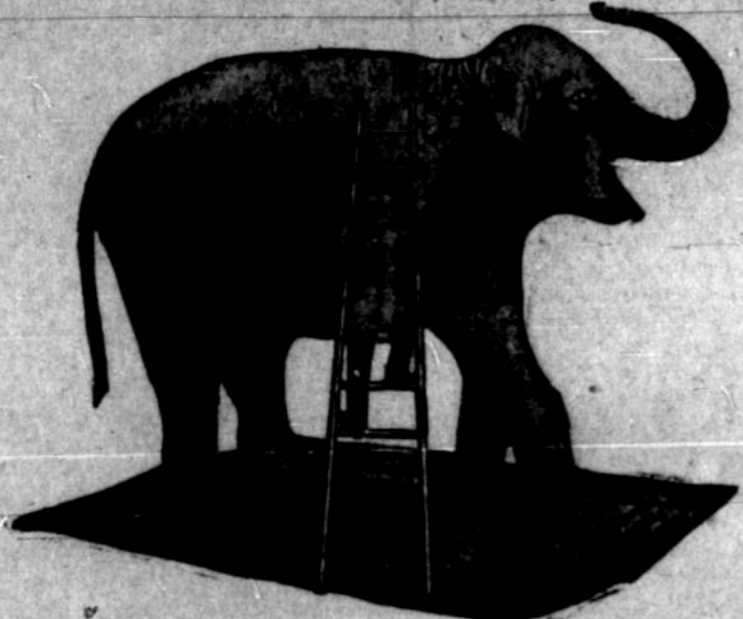

Robbins Circus and Animal Show to Give Two Performances in Coquille Next Thursday, July 1

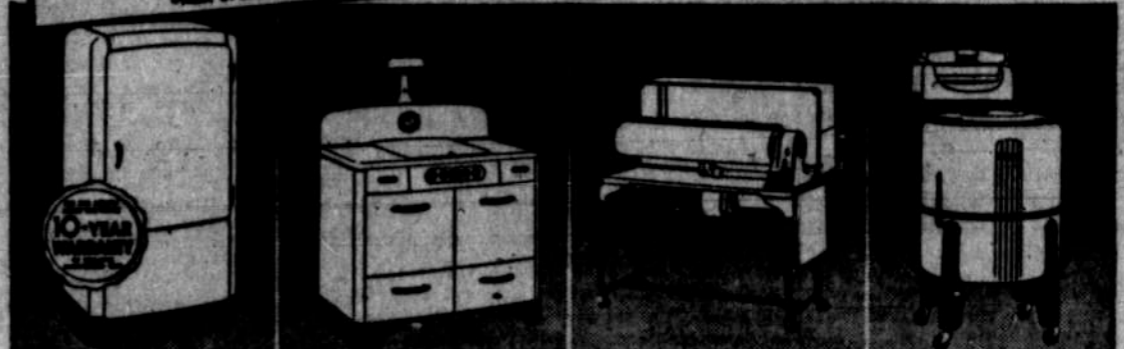
