15-Year Old Boy Accidentally Shot Self--Will Live

Reed Gallier, Jr., 15-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Gallier, was accidentally shot with a .22 calibre rifle bullet at Gold Beach Sunday afternoon. The bullet entered his abdomen, puncturing the small intestines in three places and lodging in muscles near the spine.

Although it was four hours before a surgeon could be found to attend the lad he apparently was little worse off for the delay as he rallied from the operation, performed in the Gold Beach hospital, and is believed on the road to recovery. He held his own right from the start and unless complications set in within a day or two his wound should heal rapidly.

Target shooting, about 4:00 p. m. Sunday, the lad set his gun down, butt on the ground and barrel against his side, while he paused to do something else. The trigger was touched in some manner and the gun exploded.

After being wounded Reed fired three shots from his gun as a signal to his parents but the shots were not heard. He then started to walk home, falling down at intervals. His companion, Harold Howe, who was several hundred yards away, heard Reed's shouts and went to meet him, not knowing what had happened. He returned to summon aid.
