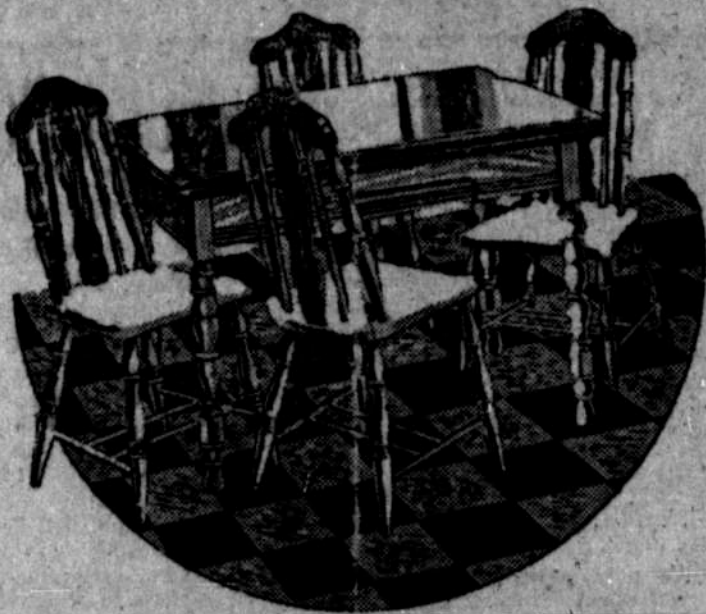


Maple Dinette Set with green trim

cruel and inhuman treatment.

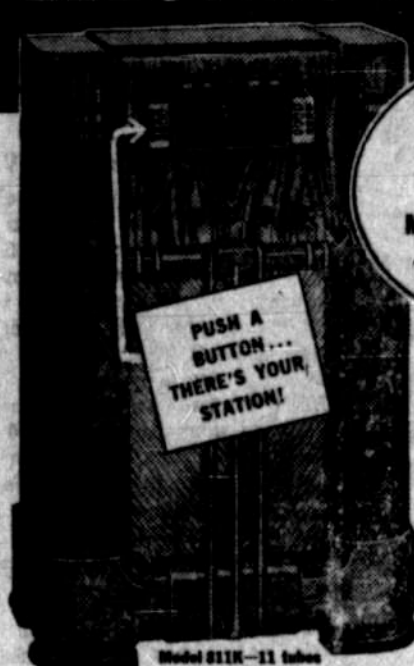

Chaney Talks at Rotary Club
