Mrs. Stonehill received a lacerated cheek and a cut on the head. Riding with her were E. H. Freeman, San Jose, who has a lacerated eyeball and face and a broken nose; also Miss Helen Hocking, of Hollywood, Cal., who has a broken wrist.

In another car was John Haymond, who has a broken wrist, and Mrs. John Haymond, who was badly bruised. They are residents of Portland, where Mr. Haymond is said to be an officer in the police force.

The third car was driven by Roy Broadman, of Oakland, Cal., who was uninjured. He was driving alone.

The fourth car contained Mr. and Mrs. O. H. Dawson, of Baytown, Tex., and Mrs. J. W. Caderhead, of Hayville, La. Mr. Dawson was uninjured; his wife suffered bad bruises

and Mrs. Caderhead has a back injury.

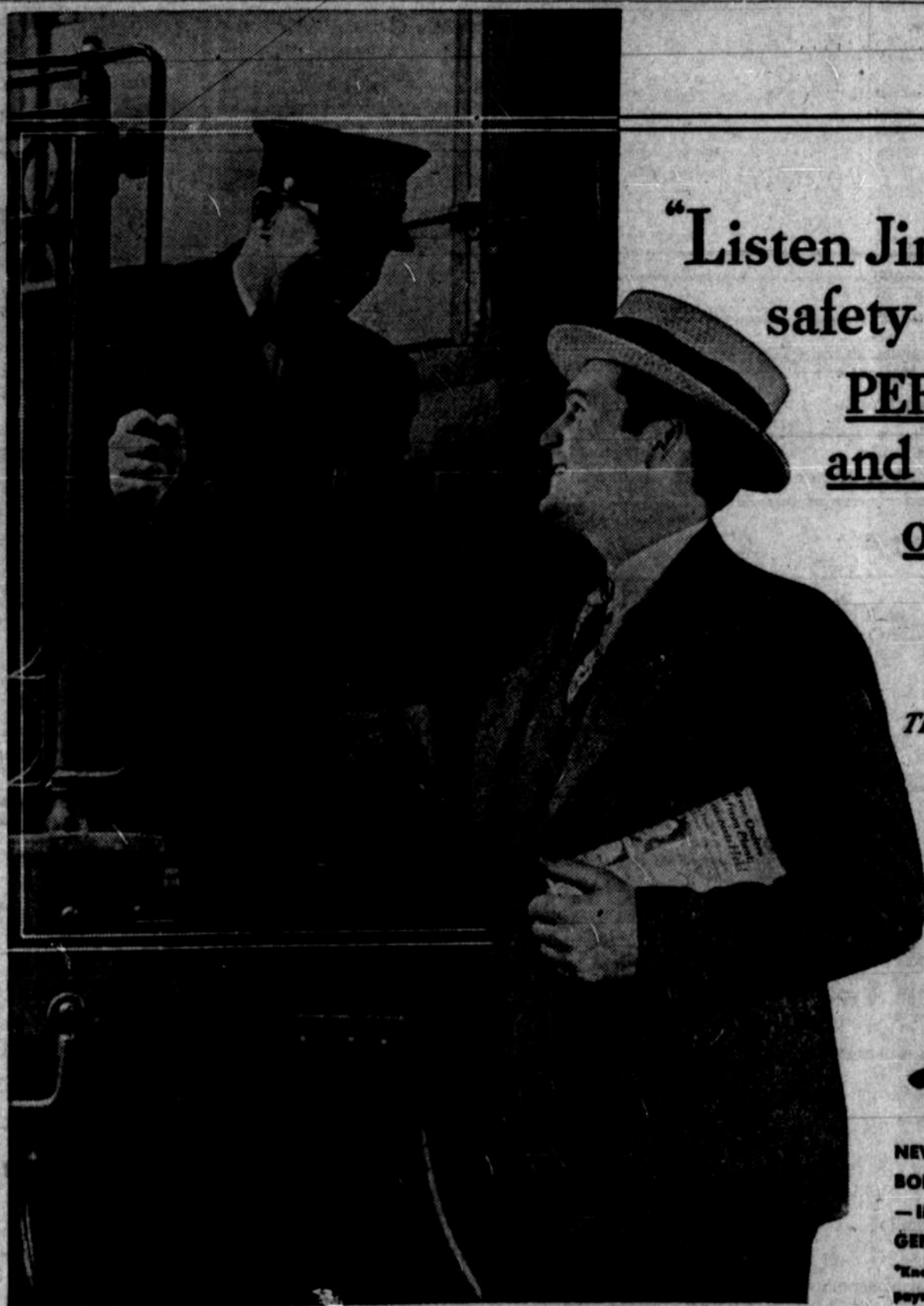

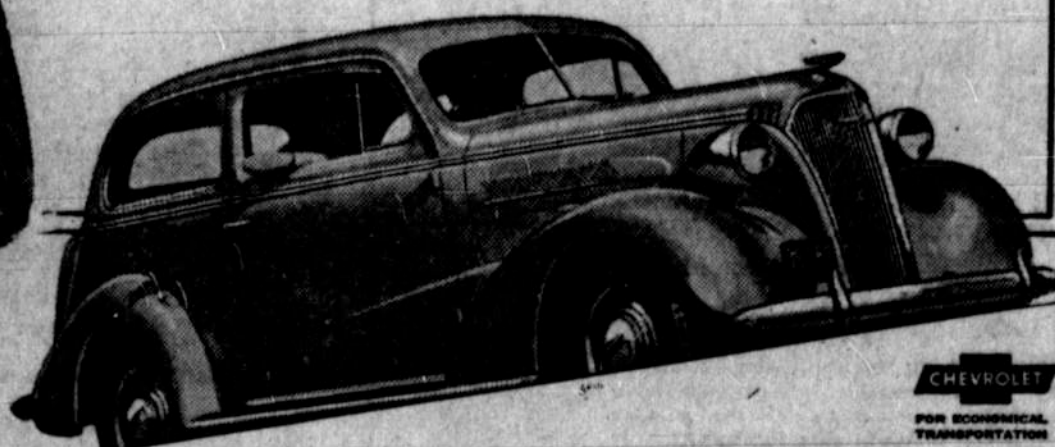
