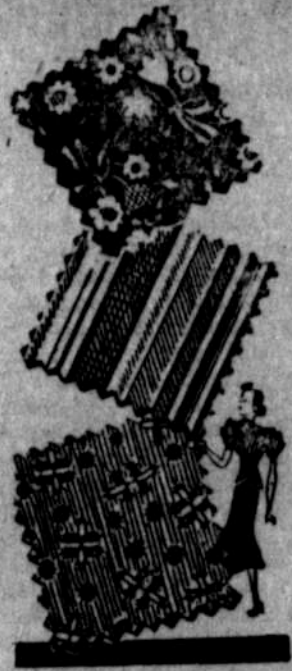

### 4-H Club Livestock Tour

The third annual tour for 4-H club livestock members from Douglas, Coos and Curry counties will be held in Coos county on Monday and Tuesday, August 9 and 10, according to George H. Jenkins, county agent, who is making local arrangements for the tour.

During the two-day period several farms will be visited in different sections of Coos county, where different classes of livestock will be judged by the club members. In addition to the judging practice some attention will be given to different phases of livestock management and other farm problems, it is stated.

A 4-H livestock team consists of three members and at least three or four members with a leader of each livestock club is being urged to take part on the tour. Parents and friends are also invited.

A truck load of club members is expected from Douglas county with A. E. Britton, county club leader, also a group from Curry county with R. M. Knox, county agent. L. J. Allen, assistant state club leader from Corvallis, will be present to assist in livestock judging and other educational features.

Scores will be kept. The results of the practice judging on this tour is expected to determine the winning team which will represent Coos county at the Oregon State Fair in September. The team placing second may also have the opportunity of representing the county in other contests, Jenkins stated.

The tour will last two days and each club is being requested to furnish food enough for these two days. Time will be available for recreational activities around camp Monday night.

The first farm visited will be in the vicinity of Coquille and the detailed schedule will be furnished to each club member and leader before the tour is held.
