Bandon Still Hopeful

(Western World)

Change in the management of the Oregon office of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, from which F. Slade retired on August 1, is believed to have caused further delay in reaching a conclusion on the proposed disaster loan for Bandon, however late Associated Press reports from Washington through Congressman James W. Mott, are that the disaster loan corporation has tentatively agreed to loan \$225,000 "without any strings" if the city cannot raise the additional funds required in the original commitment.

The original commitment called for \$117,000 from other sources, presumably WPA. Later this amount was reduced to \$46,000 with intimation that plans would be modified. The Portland office was to have conferred with E. J. Griffith, head of WPA for Oregon, to determine just how much assistance could be obtained, but the change held this matter up as no report of a conference has been received.

The state bond commission has been asked by Bandon to act as the depository for Bandon securities in the debt liquidation, but so far no acceptance has been received from them. It is understood they are waiting to hear from the Portland firm of bond attorneys that is to give an opinion as to the legality of new bonds that the city of Bandon will have to issue to the government in payment of the \$225,000 loan.

The loan is based on a law passed by the 1937 Oregon legislature which removes the limit of five per cent of assessed valuation in the event a municipality is borrowing from a government agency. Unless the attorneys question the constitutionality of the law, it is believed by local officials, that there should be no objection. If the opinion of the attorneys should be negative, and the federal government should accept the opinion as final, it is difficult to predict what the next move will be. Under ordinary circumstances a test case would have to be filed in order to secure a supreme court decision on the law. This would, of course, entail a great deal more delay and would no doubt make the execution of Bandon's plans for a new model city that much more difficult.
