Fish Fry Are Planted

A total of 344,000 fingerling cut-throat and steelhead trout, all three inches and over, were planted in the streams of Coos and Curry counties recently under the supervision of Ed. E. Smith of the state trout hatchery on Ferry creek, where the trout were hatched and raised, says the Western World.

The distribution was made with the state fish truck, driven by Mr. Walsh. The truck is especially equipped with an air pump connected with the motor, which keeps the water cool and supplies it with sufficient oxygen. There is practically no loss in the delivery of the fish from the hatchery to the streams.

The distribution of fish was made as follows:

Coos county: Cutthroats — Rock creek, 5,000; North Fork Millcomia 20,000; North Fork Coquille, 5,000; Ten Mile Lake, 5,000; East Fork Coquille, 15,000. Steelhead — South Fork Coquille, 15,000; Upper Rock Creek, 10,000; Rock creek, 10,000; East Fork Coquille, 20,000; North Fork Coquille, 10,000; Ten Mile Lake, 35,000.

Curry county: Cutthroats — Chelso river, 25,000; Pistol river, 5,000; Elk river, 5,000; Sixes river, 5,000; Floras creek, 10,000. Steelhead — Hunter's creek, 25,000; Pistol river, 25,000; Elk river, 35,000; Sixes river, 35,000; Floras creek, 24,000.
