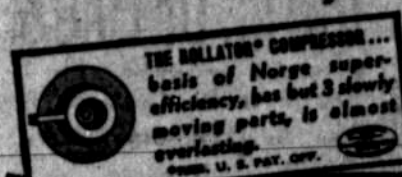

It was shown that he handled the 1936 crop in a very satisfactory manner and growers felt confident that this year's berries will be distributed at a reasonable figure through Mr. Ivie.

The 1937 crop in southwestern Oregon will be about the same as that of 1936, it was reported. Although the new crop is below the average, the new acreage will supply the added production. The total crop is estimated at 13,000 bushels. The production over the whole United States is expected to be a little above the average.—Western World.
