Riverton Schools Are Ready for Fall Opening

the various types of school rooms. The two upstairs front rooms are repainted in colors which absorb less light than the previous shades. The old paint absorbed 58 per cent of the light that should have been reflected from the walls. The new shades of tan for the wainscoting and casings and light cream for the ceiling absorb only about 18 to 20 per cent of the light. This allows more adequate lighting with less use of artificial light. The work of reconditioning the floors, which was started last year, was continued and made them much lighter and more attractive. The toilet facilities are being improved and enlarged to meet the demands of the state education department, which specifies minimum building requirements for standard schools.
 The high school library will be rearranged in the study hall in such a way that it will be fenced off from the remainder of the study hall. This will allow a better check on the books and a much better looking study room. A new set of "Americana" encyclopedias and several small dictionaries are being added to the library, as well as about thirty new volumes chosen from the Oregon state library list. The library will also be furnished with six current magazines and two newspapers—a Portland daily paper and a local weekly.
 The domestic science department which for several years has been dreamed about at Riverton will at last be a reality. The plumbing, cabinets, and electric stove, installed below cost by the Mountain States Power Company, are in the northeast corner room upstairs. The small equipment has been ordered and everything will be ready for the new course in home-making, which has proved so popular in other schools of the state. "Home-making" involves a study of cooking, sewing, interior decorating, etiquette, family relationships, child care, and other phases of a girl's life in her home as a girl and as a grown woman.
 The Smith-Hughes recitation room has been moved to the southwest corner room and a door has been cut through the wall so that the science laboratory is connected with the Smith-Hughes room. This arrangement will allow better use of the science equipment both for the science courses and the agriculture course. Several additions are to be made to the science equipment which will materially add to the effectiveness of the general science and biology instruction, as well as to meet the state requirements.
 The Riverton school boards deserve commendation for being able to handle the financial affairs of the district in such a way as to improve the school building and equipment, buy three new buses, build bus sheds,
