Wise people will bet this way: Coquille to beat Marshfield by one touchdown. But take it easy. Don't give points and have a tie call all bets off.

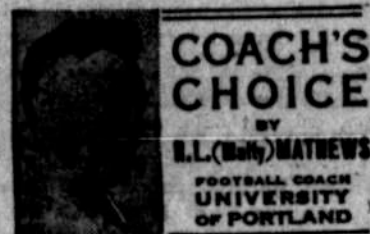
California will ride over Oregon State. Be careful again about giving points in abundance.

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Bandon Makes Offer to

Its Securities Holders (Western World)

The problem of debt settlement, which is the greatest obstacle to plans for the reconstruction of the city of Bandon, and which must be effected before any federal moneys can be obtained on a loan through the Disaster Loan Corporation, was attacked in earnest by the city, through the aid of the Citizens Rebuilding Commission, during the past week.

At an adjourned meeting of the city council, held Thursday of last week the groundwork was laid for what is considered an equitable consideration of all security holders, and early this week a circular letter, explaining the settlement offer was prepared and is being sent to bond and warrant holders. With it is enclosed a memorandum of agreements, to be filled out and signed by the security holders and to be returned to the city.

The offer made in the circular is based on the 25-35 per cent basis, plus Land Participation Certificates, as contained in the commitment from the federal government and for which an amount of \$81,000 is included in the total loan commitment of \$225,000.

A second resolution adopted by the council and which is directed to the Sheriff of Coos county as tax collector, orders that only cash be accepted in collection of taxes on levies made by the City of Bandon. This makes it impossible to use the old warrants of the city, on which settlement is being attempted, in the payment of taxes.

A committee of O. C. Shindler, R. T. Moore and John H. Fasnacht visited the county court yesterday and practically completed arrangements whereby the City of Bandon acquires the tax title property of the county Bandon.

According to the arrangement there will be no transfer of title from the county at present except on such lots or parcels as are sold by the city, in which event the proceeds of the sale will be turned over to the county to apply on the purchase of the entire holdings.

Applications for the purchase of such property will not be received by the city and sales, according to the Citizens Rebuilding Commission, will be authorized wherever the property is actually to be used and future taxes are to be paid rather than to be held for speculation.
