Council Asks Co-operation in Keeping Streets Clean

was for \$245 by F. H. Freeman and the other for \$260 by J. O. Foss.

The councilmen doubted the advisability of trying to do any kalsomining of the upper part of the walls, but did favor painting around the entrance and the stage. A committee—O. L. Wood, Drue Cunningham and G. T. Harrington—was named to inspect the building and report on what must be done there this fall.

The idea of ceiling and painting the interior, advocated by the Eagles lodge, with proceeds from dances there, had to be given up when the first dance failed to produce worthwhile amount.

It was ordered that cave troughs be placed along the north side of the building to protect it from the water that runs into the building whenever there is a heavy rain.

The occupants of the old Lapp house, between Fifth and Sixth in the east part of town, which property now belongs to the city, were notified that it would be necessary to pay three months' rent each month, the current and two delinquent months,

if they wish to remain there. No rent has been received on the property for nearly a year. The time of redemption for the foreclosed property expires next month.

The council voted to pay for 25 feet of sewer connection, that portion which is in the street, for Harry A. Slack's new home at First and Division streets. The property has already paid for two laterals, but neither of them will drain the six-foot basement of his house.

Holly and Bush street property owners have contributed \$8 per lot for graveling a couple of blocks out in the northeast part of town. The council ordered the street department to take up the old, rotten plank, and grade the streets before the gravel is spread.

Fourth street property owners, with Wm. Ireland as spokesman, asked that the city gravel the Fourth and Division street sections on the hill in the Patterson Grove section, where heavy trucking has broken through the original graveling. The council notified them that it would be necessary to do as other property owners have done, put up \$8 per lot for the purchase of the gravel. They were interested in that plan and will get to work on it.
