It was very cold the first few days out of Green River but am getting much farther south now and it is much warmer.

Yesterday I was in Split Mt. canyon when an awful hard rainstorm came on suddenly. In ten minutes there were regular waterfalls over the cliffs and a creek, right opposite where I was huddled under a rock, bringing down tons of rock and dirt. In fifteen minutes the river had changed from a dirty green to a dark red and was so muddy it would hardly make foam in the rapids.

I don't think I have lost any weight but I have surely lost some fat. Feel swell, eat a lot and get about ten hours sleep every night, even in the rain. I am absolutely comfortable, put up the tent and sleep warm and dry.

This is the most beautiful country I ever saw. Full of geese, ducks, all kinds of birds, deer, porcupine, beaver, hawks, herons, etc. The cliffs and canyons are surely impressive, to say the least, but the camera won't nearly do justice to them I know.

I will probably be in Greenriver. so you can write me there if you like. There are no rapids to speak of be-tween here and there. The natives say this rain will surely not last more than a day or two and then it will clear up for quite a spell. Had a lot more I was going to say but can't think of it now.
