#### Friday's Card Was the

#### Most Hectic Yet Seen Here

Last Friday's great wrestling card at the Community Building produced three of the greatest matches ever seen in this section of the country or any other.

First Bobbie Burns and the bizarre Baron von Hoffman staged a slug fest that will not soon be forgotten by those who saw it. And when the final gong rang ending the match, neither man was in the least disposed to cease hostilities.

A highlight of this great preliminary match was the Baron's courtly bow with which he greeted each one of Referee Elliott's admonitions to stay within the rules. And Burns' great speed was never seen to better advantage than in this bout.

At one stage of the bout Referee Harry made a Lou Gehrig slide across the ring to award a fall, overshot his mark and landed on his beam outside of the ring. As Harry leaped back into the ring a stray cat which had decided to attend the matches leaped to the arbiter's back and accompanied him pick-a-back into the ring. Both individuals looked slightly silly under the floodlights of the ring and then hastily parted company.

But to begin at the start. Both Burns and von Hoffman started slowly and cautiously. Five minutes later they were both going great guns with Florida Bobbie out maneuvering der Deutscher and kindling the flame of the latter's hair trigger temper.

After 18 minutes of the kind of ac-

tion that sports writers rave about and fans seldom see, the Baron began employing his dreaded throat clopper hold. He chopped Burns' throat and Adam's apple with the hardened edge of his hand until the Florida boy was gasping for air and then flopped him with a terrific slam in just 21 minutes.

Returning to the ring after the rest period Bobbie had just nine minutes to gain two falls for a victory. The time proved too short. But six minutes later Bob did secure a fall to even up the match by whaling away to the region of the German's immaculate Van Dyke beard with both fists. The Berliner thought that Burns hit him with the ring posts, too, but that wasn't so. Match ended a draw, though had it lasted a few minutes longer the outcome would have been different.

In a brilliant 45-minute semi final, Bob Castle who forgot his usual biting and hair pulling to score a surprisingly clean win over Don Sugal showed that he could really wrestle when he wanted to.

Sugal required just five minutes to scalp the Kansas City blaster for the first fall. The hold used was a flashing Japanese hip lock which was the first of its kind ever seen in Coquille.

Castle went after the Salem Japanese like a hungry bulldog after a piece of liver and it was in this canto that Castle pulled a few wrestling tricks out of his duffle bag to open the eyes of the ringsiders. After 13 minutes Sugal succumbed to Castle's half crab hold and patted the mat.

In a trick move which showed surprising cleverness, Castle outfoxed the Salem boy to win the third and deciding fall in just four minutes.

If the preceding bouts were high pressure, the main event outdid them both.

"Mad" Murdock who with his fangs and bald head will remind you of the late Lou Chaney's characterization of the Phantom of the Opera, was disqualified in two straight falls to give Tommy "London" Ward a win.

Tommy Ward, who has already endeared himself to the fans, tried to wrestle cleanly but when Murdock began getting a little the worst of it, he went slap dab mad and tried to annihilate both Ward and the referee.

A couple of flowers sitting in the first row had their clothes disarranged when ringsiders tried to crown Murdock with their chairs. At the conclusion of the match late fans chased the Boston maniac to the dressing room where he scurried to wait until the fans cooled off.
