The Latest in Chicken Housing on Display

One of the newest type of chicken houses there is known today is that on display in the Eaton Feed Store display window. It was made by Harry Wise, of Sanford Heights, and is attracting considerable attention. It is known as the "battery" type of chicken house and has one compartment, 12 inches wide, by 18 deep, by 18 high, for each chicken, and can be built one above the other as high as desired.

A wire mesh is provided as a floor, slightly sloping, to permit the eggs to roll out to the tray in front and also to permit the dropping to drop through on to a roofing paper tray, which allows for easy cleaning. In these Mr. Wise has built the dropping board paper is on rolls, operated with a key, but in a large battery the tray would be more efficient.

In this style of housing each compartment is a trap nest and a hen that falls down on the egg-producing job can quickly be weeded from the flock.

Of course in a winter damp country like Oregon the battery would have to be placed in a large chicken house, for the birds have no opportunity to exercise, but the plan is being followed very satisfactorily at Corvallis and Eugene.

In Chicago there is one battery of 16,000 individual units which is taken care of by two men and the money received from the droppings—used as fertilizer—pays the wages of the two men.

Harry did not say what a battery housing 12 hens, like the one on display, would cost, but it is worth investigating by either those in the chicken business or by the home owner who wants to keep a few chickens for his "ham and" in the morning.
