Checking Money Flow of City for Highway Commission

E. L. Goldhammer, a representative of the State Highway Commission, was in Coquille Monday checking the flow of funds through the municipal divisions—county, city and school district—for the year 1936.

Just what the purpose of this statewide survey is, Mr. Goldhammer could not say, but it possibly has to do with the re-allocation or distribution of the funds the commission receives from gas tax and license fees.

There are four teams of two men each who have been working over the state on this survey since September and it is expected to have it completed by Christmas.

Every kind of municipal subdivision of the state, even port, fire patrol and drainage districts, are being examined to see what funds pass through the organization's treasury.
