High Schools Are in Training for State Debate

Coquille High School's debate team is just beginning to work up material for participation in the statewide debate contest conducted by the Oregon High School Debating League. Under the sponsorship of the general extension division of the state system of higher education, debates are scheduled for early in January, the final to be broadcast over radio station KOAC about April 30.

Other Coos county schools eligible for membership are Arago, Bandon, Bridge, Coos River, Lakeside, Marshfield, Myrtle Point, North Bend, Powers and Riverton. They will compete with high schools from Curry and part of Douglas counties for the district championship. District champions last year, Coquille High, lost out in the semi-finals.

The question this year is Resolved, That the several states should adopt the unicameral (one-house) system of legislation.

The league divides Oregon into 11 districts which, through a series of contests, produce for the semi-finals a winner from eastern Oregon and one from western Oregon. These two teams meet in the final, the winner to be awarded the University Cup.

Tractor School at O. S. C.
