in which three Coos county young men had planned to sail the South Seas, was tied up at San Diego. It is still there.

Clarence did not want to steal any of Haldane's thunder by telling of the trip before Haldane got home to tell it himself, but he did say that Buzz made for a barber shop and had his whiskers shaved as quickly as he could after reaching Boulder City.
