Northwest Leads in Timber

The preeminence of the national forests of Oregon and Washington in the total national forest timber set up of the United States is shown in a forestry service survey, which estimates that the national forests of this region contain a sawtimber volume of nearly 263 billion board feet log scale. Converted to lumber tally this approximates 300 billion board feet which is 54 per cent of the estimated total sawtimber volume of all the national forests in the United States. It is nearly one-fifth of all the softwood sawtimber in the country. Oregon national forests contain 60 per cent and Washington forests 40 per cent of the regional national forest volume. The Willamette forest with headquarters at Eugene, Oregon, ranks first in timber volume with a total of nearly 40 billion board feet; the Olympic forest is second with approximately 34 billion board

feet and the Umpqua (headquarters, Roseburg, Oregon), the Columbia (headquarters, Vancouver, Washington), and the Mount Hood rank next with more than 22 billion board feet each.

Douglas fir comprises 46 per cent of the total volume and ponderosa pine 14 per cent.

Containing well over a third of the two states' saw timber, the national forests are a vital force in planning a sustained-yield program that will assure the forest industries of Oregon and Washington a permanent supply of raw material. The volume of available mature timber as well as the capacity for growth on the national forests are fundamental factors in determining sustained yield possibilities, forest officials point out. As a part of the forest survey all forest land in the two states were classified according to its ability to produce forest crops, and computations are now being made to determine the present and potential forest growth.

Total timber supply of the two states is approximately 45 per cent of that of the whole nation.

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Lee Gimlin Buried Monday

Robert Lee Gimlin, for several years a Coquille business man, passed away last Friday night at the Leo Cary ranch, two miles from the highway up Lampa creek, where he had lived for some time. Death was due to a heart attack.

To bring the body out Elbert Schroeder drove as far as he could up the Lampa creek road and finished on a hand car on the old Cary logging road.

Funeral services were held at the Schroeder chapel here at two o'clock Monday afternoon. Interment was in the Bandon cemetery.

Mr. Gimlin was born in Carroll county, Arkansas, May 17, 1870, and was seven months past 67 years of age.

He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Clarice Clarno, of Coquille, and Mrs. Jo McDonald, of Bandon; also by a brother, Jos. Gimlin, and a sister, Mrs. Myrtle Raines, both of Pomeroy, Wash.

Mrs. John Fromm Passes

Mrs. Violet Fromm, wife of John Fromm, of Port Orford, was buried there Monday, the Christian Science funeral service being read by Mrs. J. E. Norton, of this city.

Mrs. Fromm passed away in Port and last Saturday at the age of 51 years, two months and five days.

She was born at Chetco in Curry county, daughter of that well-known Curry county pioneer, Willis T. Fromm, who was one of the first to settle in the area, and she was 28 years and ten months old when she was born.

Besides her husband and father, Mrs. Fromm is survived by three sons and one daughter, Lester, Clinton, Leland and Yvonne; also by a sister, Miss Madge White, and three brothers, E. L. Wm. and Carl White.

Suicide at County Farm

August Johnson, an inmate of the Coos county farm-home for the past seven years, was found hanging from a rafter in what is termed the "hog house" Monday morning by one of the employees on the farm.

Sunday evening he had shaved and dressed, saying he was coming in to Coquille and that was the last seen of him till he found dead the next morning.

He was a former miner in the Libby mine, was 63 years, four months and one day of age, and had no living relatives so far as the superintendent, F. C. McNelly knows.

Dr. M. Earl Wilson, acting coroner, says it was so plainly a case of suicide that no inquest is necessary. The body is still at the Schroeder Bros. Mortuaries here.
