Northwest Leads in Timber

The preeminence of the national forests of Oregon and Washington in the total national forest timber set up of the United States is shown in a forestry service survey, which estimates that the national forests of this region contain a sawtimber volume of nearly 263 billion board feet log scale. Converted to lumber tally this approximates 300 billion board feet which is 54 per cent of the estimated total sawtimber volume of all the national forests in the United States. It is nearly one-fifth of all the softwood sawtimber in the coun try. Oregon national forests contain 60 per cent and Washington forests 40 per cent of the regional national forest volume. The Willamette forest with headquarters at Eugene, Oregon, ranks first in timber vo with a total of nearly 40 billion board feet; the Olympic forest is second with approximately 34 billion board

To bum a ride, or go on the bum, may sound like slang, but the Americanism has a respectable history of 70 years, compilers of the Dictionary of American English at the University of Chicago have discovered.

Twelve years of research into American usage have revealed that this peculiar new world use of an English word which originally meant "to drink" got currency as far back as 1862. In that year an eastern newspaper used the word meaning "to loaf or wander about."

"Bum," as an adjective, meaning "no good," gained entrance into America's vocabulary through the stage door, the editors of the dictionary found. As early as 1888, dra-"bum actors."

In the current slang sense "sponging," or getting something without work, "bum" made its literary debut in 1872. death, bear no evidence of Life, God, They are negative states of ignorance, indications of a lack of the understanding of God and of man's harmonious relationship to Him. Furthermore, an indifferent or merely neutral state of mind is not based upon understanding, and engenders a false sense of peace. Ignoring or condoning faults in individuals or in groups of people and nations, is not promotive of security and peace, which go in hand in hand. Selfishness and intense nationalism are foos to the peace and progress of mankind. They arise from the false belief that man's existence is dependent upon matter. This belief is entirely at variance with Scriptural authority, which reveals man's spiritual origin and nature, and with divine law, which governs individuals and nations.

The words of Mrs. Eddy in Science and Health (p. 96) give a clear sense of man's scientific unity with God, and the consequent immunity from evil, disease, and inharmony which may be realized by all. She says: "This material world is even now becoming the arena for conflicting forces. On one side there will be discord and dismay; on the other side there will be Science and peace." May we ever remember with gratitude the ever-presence of Spirit, where love, joy, and peace forever abide and abound.—The Christian Science Monitor.
