In writing to renew his subscription to the Sentinel, Geo. Henninger, who now lives in Milton, Ore., says:

Have been away from your town since 1919 and have been very much interested in the growth of Coquille as I first went there in 1898. That was before the streets were paved or any concrete walks and before there were electric lights. The street lights at that time consisted of kerosene lamps on posts, which were lighted and put out and taken care of by the marshal.

Our Christmas mail this year was the heaviest we have ever had. The weather so far this fall and winter has been very fine, very mild with abundance of rain. Our rainfall since Sept. 1st lacks about one-half inch of being normal to date. The maximum temperature yesterday, Dec. 28th, was 61 degrees.
