session which licenses the vendors. A copy of this petition has also been sent to the liquor commission.

The city's approval of beer parlors must be sent to the commission before Jan. 1, and the councilmen, because a regular meeting was not held the latter part of December, had endorsed individually as councilmen, the applications from the following: Marlin Brandon, class C package store; W. H. Fortier, class B; Linn Bowling Alley, class B; Allen & Linn, class B; and Jos. Belonie Violette, class B. The latter is an Independence, Oregon, man who owns a chain of beer parlors in the state and has taken an option to purchase the concrete building on Front street, where Harry Dimmick's cafe and Ron & Frank's barber shop are now located. Having already agreed by their individual endorsement of Mr. Violette's application for a beer selling permit, and which approval had already gone forward to the state liquor commission, the councilmen did not feel like reversing themselves and Mr. Violette's application was approved with the others.

What the liquor commission will do with the remonstrance of 69 Coquille business men against the licensing of Violette's proposed beer parlors remains to be seen.

The councilmen expressed themselves as willing to oppose the issuance of new beer licenses in the future.

Card and pool room licenses were granted to W. H. Fortier, Howell & Elkins and Jos. B. Violette.

Restaurant licenses were granted to the Yellow Lantern, The Rainbow, the Quelle Cafe, the Coquille Hotel, Brandon's the Pastime and Tommy Wing's Coquille Cafe.

The street committee was asked to look over a V-shaped tract of land adjoining the Roy Folsom place on the highway north of Seventh street. The city secured it through foreclosure of delinquent improvement assessments. Mr. Folsom is willing to pay the taxes and assessments, but asks the city to rescind its interest charge.

Lafe Compton's request that the city ease up on its tagging of outside cars for parking infractions caused considerable discussion. Recorder Leslie stated that outside car owners had not been fined, when tagged, unless they were "nasty" in their attitude, and then only a dollar.
