### Talked on Safety Driving

Stressing the importance of the right driving attitude on the part of the young motorists of the nation, John Kerrick, representative from the office of Secretary of State Earl Snell, spoke at an assembly at Coquille high school Wednesday afternoon.

Kerrick's talk was accompanied by the showing of two movies, "We Drivers" and "Once Upon a Time." More than 10,000 students have already been addressed by Kerrick, who recently completed two trips which took him into 71 high schools in the eastern and northern part of

the state. He plans to appear in every one of Oregon's 200 high schools before the end of the current school year. His present tour will include 33 high schools along the coast.

"Young people are physically capable of becoming excellent drivers," the speaker said, "but it is necessary for them to practice courtesy and caution in order to be excellent drivers. The capable driver is one who can drive well while the good driver is one who does drive well."

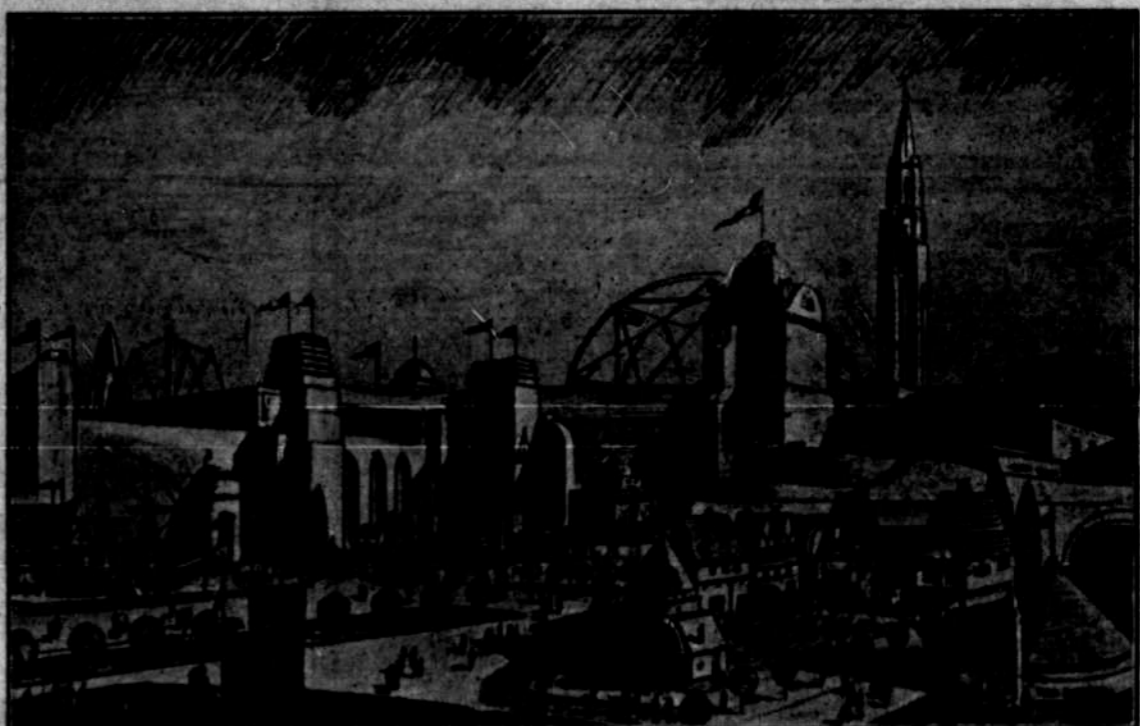

## Exposition Offers \$1,000 Prize for Name of Midway

SAN FRANCISCO—Wanted—a catchy, snappy name for the Amusement Zone of the 1933 Golden Gate International Exposition, on Treasure Island in San Francisco Bay.

One thousand dollars cash will be paid to the person submitting the name selected.

This was announced by Exposition executives who declared they are seeking a name for the Amusement Zone that will be different and new—a name suggesting fun, thrills, gaiety, color, and one that is short, catchy and easy to remember.

At the Panama Pacific Exposition in San Francisco in 1915 the Amusement Zone was titled "The Zone." At the Century of Progress in Chicago it was called "The Midway," while at the St. Louis Exposition of 1904 they called it "The Pike."

World-famous showmen are planning the most colorful Amusement Zone of any World's Fair in history for Treasure Island in 1933. Music, pageants, cavalcades, girl shows,

harkers, roaring thrill rides, foreign villages will be some of the features of the Amusement Zone. Scenic railways, double Ferris wheels, sky-rides will be a part of this center of fun for which the Exposition wishes a name.

Treasure Island's Amusement Zone will have all the glamor and romance of the Pacific Ocean to draw from—the South Seas, Latin-America, Lands of the Southern Cross, the Orient and Far East. Thousands of applications for concessions already have been received, including Javanese and Oriental restaurants, complete with idol dancers, native foods and exotic decorations; under-water rides at San Francisco Bay, and breath-taking mechanical devices.

Names submitted in the Amusement Zone Name Contest must not exceed three words and must be received not later than February 18, 1933, at the offices of the 1933 World's Fair Contest Committee, Treasure Island, on San Francisco Bay.
