"True Confession" Is "Lie vs. Truth" Comedy

Carole Lombard and Fred Mac-Murray are joined by John Barry-more in the co-starring leads of the comedy-drama, "True Confession," which opens Sunday at the Roxy Theatre.

In the film, Miss Lombard and MacMurray play the parts of a struggling young lawyer and his wife, constantly at sword's-ends because of the conflict between Miss Lombard's inborn habit of lying and MacMurray's love for truth.
