Courses and Instructors

Course 111B: "My Christian Beliefs." In this course, questions regarding the beliefs of the historic Christian faith, and the Christian faith of today, with interpretations of each are studied, and students are guided to develop a satisfying personal religious faith and life purpose. Instructor: Rev. G. R. Turney, pastor of St. James' Episcopal Church.

Course 123B: "The Prophets and Their Messages." In this course are studied the reforms for which the Hebrew prophets struggled and the conditions in trade relations in religion and in other affairs which each prophet faced. What the people thought of prophecy and what effect each prophet had on changing the standards of Hebrew life are considered. Instructor: Rev. R. D. E. Smith, pastor of Assemblies of God Church.

Course 241B: "Guiding the Religious Growth of Primary Children." This course deals with ways in which the teacher or other leader may guide the primary child in developing a wholesome Christian personality. Instructor: Mrs. Elwyn Nosler.

Course 251B: "Guiding the Religious Growth of Juniors." This course deals with ways in which the teacher or other leader may guide the junior child in developing a wholesome Christian personality. Instructor: Rev. H. L. Graybeal, pastor of Pioneer Methodist Church.

Courses 311B and 312B: "Guiding Youth's Approach to Religion;" "Understanding Ourselves." In the first course leaders of youth may consider the problems and difficulties faced by young people in their religious thinking and practice, and may endeavor to discover what religious ideas and habits are most helpful to youth. (Primarily a course for adult leaders of youth.) The other course is for young people, in which they will study to discover why they think, feel, act as they do, and how to guide their own religious growth. Instructor: Rev. W. A. Religious Education
