### Fine Showing Made by Farm Loan Ass'n Secretary

"Congratulations to national farm loan association directors, secretaries and local field men on the important part they played in helping transfer back more real estate to farmers in 1932 than ever before in the 20-year history of our co-operative mortgage financing system."

This is the complimentary message received this week by E. J. Tilley from Ward K. Newcomb, vice president of the district Land bank at Spokane, in connection with the announcement that sales of farm property by the bank, totalling approximately 1500 pieces throughout the four northwest states, reached a new record volume of \$4,363,000 during the past year.

Mr. Tilley is secretary-treasurer for the Coos-Curry farm loan associations in this district serving their members through a central business office at Coquille. The associations are closing new first mortgage loans through the Land bank at a present interest rate of four per cent per annum. They own capital stock in the district bank in proportion to the amount of outstanding loans they have closed for their farmer-members since organization, dating back to 1917.

"Because of the Land bank's eagerness to return its farm holdings to individual ownership just as rapidly as qualified buyers can be found, we naturally are greatly pleased to report that sales in 1932 broke all previous records," Mr. Newcomb writes. "Decentralized selling efforts and good teamwork by local association officers and directors added the winning touch."

Although many farmers moving to the northwest from drought-hit areas of the middlewest bought farms from the bank, the bulk of sales was made to tenant farmers already established in the neighborhood, and to adjoining farm owners, Mr. Newcomb reports.

"During the past two years cash down payments, averaging around 25 per cent, have been higher than any time since the depression," he says, indicating that ability to buy has increased. We find that the impulse to buy farm land comes natural to persons seeking security and who want a safe investment. When cash income improves, as during the past two years, land moves readily in considerable volume."

The local farm loan associations and district bank are continuing to

offer acquired farm property on favorable terms to farmers who have the qualifications to succeed. Mr. Tilley announces, in addition to making new mortgage loans at a record low four per cent interest rate.
