City Council Met Monday Evening

had submitted a bid to the council to install all the necessary equipment on a truck to be purchased by the city for \$900, and further recommended the installation of an engine which would cost \$200, making the flusher also available for fire-fighting.

After adopting an ordinance providing for the issuance of \$2286.66 of bonds for the Elliott and First street gravelled improvement, the city treasurer was authorized to purchase the bonds with water funds now in the treasury and which will not be needed very soon for water bond retirement. The city will in this way be earning the five per cent interest on that amount of idle water funds.

An ordinance placing a lien on 18 pieces of property for the sidewalk repairs made last fall along the highway, out to the high school, was also adopted.

The recorder was instructed to offer the War Veterans State Aid Commission \$1,000 for the tract at the big reservoir on Rink creek, which if secured will provide the city with all the land on the watershed around the source of supply. The only object in making this purchase is to prevent contamination of the supply as would probably result from the use of the tract as a private party.

The request of property owners that the city re-gravel the road leading to the ball park from the end of the paving on Heath street was laid over until the next meeting. The property owners have grounds for this request for the street is used by cars going out there to ball games and last summer the surface was badly cut up by the two circuses which used the ball park as a show grounds.

A resolution was adopted giving an option to Rev. W. A. Stephens for the property on North Heath street which he is now renting for \$20 per month. The sale cannot be made until July when the former owner's right of redemption expires. An adjournment was taken until next Monday evening when a matter concerning city employees is to come up.

To Print 150,000 Folders

J. E. Norton, president of the Coast Highway Association, announced at the Chamber of Commerce meeting Tuesday noon that a meeting of the association's board of control was to be held in Reedsport this, Thursday, noon and that another would be held in Florence in a week or two. One of the purposes is to secure the financial co-operation of Douglas county in support of the association's program.

He also announced that the secretary-manager, Ed Miller, had been instructed to call for bids for 150 thousand of the Coast Highway folders for distribution this year. This will be 25,000 more than were printed and distributed last year.

The price is 16.94 cents per gallon at Coos Bay, Coquille and Myrtle Point, 17.44 at Bandon, delivered. The Standard was the low bidder in the final analysis, but any reduction in retail prices during the year will shave the price the county pays by that amount.
