### Wool Pictures to Be Featured Jan. 29

A sound motion picture entitled, "Wool—Its Production and Marketing," will be shown at the annual meeting of the Coos County Livestock Association which will be held in the high school building in Myrtle Point next Monday, January 31, at 8:00 p. m., according to J. F. VanLeuven, president of the organization.

This picture which shows the production and marketing of wool from the sheep's back to your overcoat has been released by the Farm Credit Administration. It is directed by James M. Coon, who is thoroughly familiar with the production and marketing of wool by actual experience on the range and at the grading table.

Mr. Coon, with Bruce Strachan, field representative for the Pacific Wool Growers, will accompany the picture and both will make a short talk on the preparation and marketing of wool. The picture will provide an opportunity for producers of wool actually to witness the physical handling of it, obtaining a much better understanding of all phases of the business.

Directors and officers of the livestock association will be elected for 1933, and the objects of the Western Oregon Livestock Association which will hold its annual meeting in Roseburg on February 7 and 8 will be explained. Arrangements were made to have this picture shown in connection with the annual livestock meeting by Geo. Jenkins, county agent, working in cooperation with R. W. Schaad, Smith-Hughes instructor in Myrtle Point. Members of the evening school conducted in the Gaylord community by Mr. Schaad are planning to attend this meeting.

Dr. W. H. Wright, director of Lick observatory on Mt. Hamilton near San Jose, Calif., and who has just received astronomy's highest award, is a friend of Bert Gould, of this city, and when the latter was a boy the now famous astronomer spent his summer vacations at the Gould "Elk-horn ranch" near Allegany, fishing and hunting with Bert and his brothers.

The award and gold medal are presented by the Royal Astronomical society of Great Britain and is bestowed "for his studies of gaseous nebulae and novae and for his discoveries in planetary photography."

The San Jose Mercury quotes Dr. Wright as modestly saying that the honor was not personal but is in recognition of the work done by Lick observatory.

Howard M. Rigler, of Portland, was selected as construction superintendent of the new Coquille gymnasium-auditorium at a special meeting of the Coquille school board Monday afternoon.

Selection of this official is compulsory under the PWA contract and his duties are to look after the interests of the school district in seeing that the building is constructed according to plans and specifications.

Mr. Rigler has been construction engineer on a number of Portland projects including the Multnomah Civic Stadium, New Heathman Hotel, Portland Public Market and a number of school buildings.

Until recently Rigler has been superintending cement work at the Bonneville Dam.

### Concerning Religious Instruction

At the last regular meeting of the Coquille School Board a request was made by Rev. W. A. Stephens, president of the local ministerial association, that religious education be included in the public school program, the course to be sponsored and financed by the Coquille Ministerial Association.


The plan suggested is to teach this course to the third, fourth and fifth grades of the Washington school. For the third grade the course would be taught after their school day and they would not miss any of their school work. In the fourth and fifth grades it would be substituted for another class and the work missed would have to be made up, so in this case they should not miss any of their regular school work.

The Coquille school board, not being certain whether a program of this kind should be included in the school curriculum or handled entirely by the churches, does not wish to establish any future policy. They have agreed to give the project a trial for the remainder of this school year, providing parents of the children in the grades mentioned make the request.

An explanatory letter and registration blank for those who are interested to sign and return are being sent to the parents of all children in the third, fourth and fifth grades.

Next June Coquille will become a first class school district and there will be five school directors instead of three. Continuation of the week-day Bible school classes will depend upon community response and upon the new board next June.
